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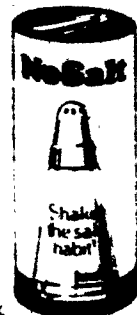
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Program Offers Summer Employment

Four hundred youths will work this summer as recreation counselors, teacher aides, conservation workers, typists, and in a variety of other positions through the Summer Youth Employment Program sponsored by the Oswego County Department of Employment and Training.

The program provides jobs at public and non-profit agencies in Oswego County from June 27 through Aug. 19. According to Nancy Bellow, deputy director of the Department of Employment and Training, the youths will work 30 hours per week, earning \$3.75 per hour.

Youths age 14 to 21 who are considered economically disadvantaged according to federal guidelines are eligible for the program. Jobs will be available in all school districts in the county.

"The purpose of the Summer Youth Employment Program is to provide eco-

nomically disadvantaged youths with an opportunity to increase their employment potential, and develop positive work habits, while earning a summer income," said Bellow. "Participants will also attend workshops to give them an idea of occupational and career opportunities, and build on their basic job readiness skills."

The summer jobs include groundskeepers, custodians, kitchen aides, day camp counselors, conservation workers, clerical and maintenance workers, and child care aides.
