He has interested himself in Boy Scout work, and has held the position of Scout Commissioner in Nassau county. He is 45 years of age, married, and has a son and a daughter, and will move his family here as soon as he decides upon a house.

Harry Hanford Tells of Experience on U. S. S. Arkansas  
Harry Hanford of this village, who joined the navy in the spring, has been visiting his father and sister here during the past few days and he has many interesting experiences to relate.  
The young sailor has been across to France several times as a member of the crew of the U. S. S. Arkansas and on one of these occasions a submarine was sighted about four miles away. One shot from the big battleship knocked the submarine's periscope off and the submarine tipped up on end and sank in view of the crew who had assembled on deck for action.  
Mr. Hanford says that thus far he had not met anyone whom he knew, either on sea or in port as there are no others from this section on his ship or its consorts.  
He likes the life and work in the service and says the men are well taken care of and provided for in the matter of food and clothing.
