DECLARATION NOTICE of State of New York.

Office of the Secretary of State, Albany, August 1st, 1859. To the Sheriff of the County of Ulster: Six Notices in hereby given, that at the General Election to be held in this State on the Tuesday succeeding the next Monday, to-wit: November 1st, 1859, the following officers are to be elected, to-wit: A Secretary of State, in the place of Gideon J. Tucker; a Comptroller, in the place of Sanford E. Church; an Attorney-General, in the place of Lyman Tremain; a State Engineer and Surveyor, in the place of Van R. Richmond; a State Treasurer, in the place of Isaac V. Vanderpool; a Canal Commissioner, in the place of Charles H. Sherrill; an Inspector of State Prisons, in the place of Wesley Bailey; a Judge of the Court of Appeals, in the place of Alexander S. Johnson; a Clerk of the Court of Appeals, in the place of Russell F. Hicks; all whose terms of office will expire on the last day of December next. Also a Justice of the Supreme Court for the Third Judicial District, in the place of Ira Harris, whose term of office will expire on the last day of December next. Also a Senator for the Tenth Senate District, comprising the counties of Ulster and Greene. County Officers to be elected: Three Members of Assembly; a County Judge, in the place of Nicholas R. Graham; a Surrogate, in the place of Jesse F. Bookstaver; a District Attorney, in the place of Joseph D. Shafer; two Justices of Sessions, in the place of Thomas Bingham and William Johnson; two Coroners, in the place of Nathaniel J. Lefeaver and John A. Bodley; all whose terms of office will expire on the last day of December next.

The attention of Inspectors of Election and County Canvassers is directed to chap. 271, of Laws of 1859, a copy of which is printed herewith, for instructions in regard to their duties under said act, "submitting to the people a law authorizing a loan of two million five hundred thousand dollars, to provide for the payment of the floating debt of the State."

AN ACT to submit to the people a law authorizing a loan of two million five hundred thousand dollars, to provide for the payment of the floating debt of the State. [Passed April 13th, 1859—three-fifths being present.]

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: SECTION 1. The Commissioners of the canal fund are hereby authorized to borrow on the credit of state two million five hundred thousand dollars, at a rate not exceeding six per cent per annum, and reimbursable at such periods as shall be determined by the said Commissioners not exceeding eighteen years from the time of making such loan. All the provisions of law in relation to loans made by the commissioners of the canal fund, and the issue and transfer of certificates of stock, shall apply to loans authorized by this act.

SECTION 2. The moneys realized by such loan shall be applied exclusively to the payment of claims against the state not otherwise provided for, for work done on the canals of the state, and for private property appropriated by the state for the use of such canals, or for the payment of the principal and interest of such loan, and for no other purpose whatever.

SECTION 3. Two million five hundred thousand dollars is hereby appropriated, to be paid out of the treasury, on the warrant of the Auditor of the canal department, from the said moneys, within two years from the time when this act shall take effect, for the payment of claims against the state, specified in the last preceding section, and for the payment of the interest on the loan authorized by this act, but any sum applied to pay interest as aforesaid, may be refunded out of the proceeds of the said taxes when received into the treasury.

SECTION 4. An annual tax is hereby imposed, and shall be levied and collected in the same manner as other state taxes are levied and collected, sufficient to pay the interest and redeem the principal of the loan hereby authorized, within the period of eighteen years from the time of contracting said loan, and shall be sufficient to pay the interest and redeem the principal of said loan within said period of eighteen years; and shall in each year apportion the sum so required among the several counties of this state, according to the then last corrected assessment rolls returned to his office, and shall give notice of such apportionment to the several supervisors of the respective counties. It shall be the duty of the boards of supervisors of the respective counties to cause the amount so apportioned in each year to be levied and collected and paid to the Treasurer of this State, in the same manner as other State taxes. The moneys collected and paid into the treasury under this section shall constitute a sinking fund to pay the interest and redeem the principal of the loan contracted pursuant to this act, and shall be sacredly applied to that purpose; and if, at any time, the sinking fund shall be insufficient to comply with the requirements of this section, the Comptroller shall increase the sum thereafter to be levied and collected by tax in each year, so as to make the fund adequate for the purpose aforesaid.

SECTION 5. The fourth section of this act, imposing a tax may be repealed whenever the revenues of the canals, after meeting all present constitutional charges upon them, shall amount to enough to form a sinking fund sufficient to pay the interest and redeem the principal of all loans within the eighteen years mentioned in the first section of this act.

SECTION 6. This act shall be submitted to the people of this State at the next general election, and the votes given for its adoption, shall be endorsed "Constitutional Loan," and shall be in the following form: "For a loan of two million five hundred thousand dollars, to pay the floating debt of the State;" and against a loan of two million five hundred thousand dollars to pay the floating debt of the State." The inspectors of the several election districts in this state, shall provide a separate box, in which the ballots given in pursuance of this act shall be deposited. The ballots shall be canvassed and returned, and the result shall be determined and certified in the same manner as votes given for the office of Governor of this State. If a majority of the votes cast, pursuant to this act, shall be "For a loan of two million five hundred thousand dollars to pay the floating debt of the State," then the preceding sections of this act shall take effect; but if a majority of the votes so cast, shall be "Against a loan of two million five hundred thousand dollars to pay the floating debt of the State," then the said sections shall not take effect, but shall be inoperative.

SECTION 7. You are without delay to deliver a copy of this act to the

Supervisor of each town or ward in your county; and also to cause a copy of said notice to be published in all the public newspapers printed in your county, once in each week until the election.

Johnson; a Clerk of the Court of Appeals, in the place of Russell F. Hicks; all whose terms of office will expire on the last day of December next. Also a Justice of the Supreme Court, for the Third Judicial District, in the place of Ira Harris, whose term of office will expire on the last day of December next. Also a Senator for the Tenth Senate District, comprising the counties of Ulster and Greene.

County Officers to be elected: Three Members of Assembly; a County Judge, in the place of Nicholas R. Graham; a Surrogate, in the place of Jesse F. Bookstaver; a District Attorney, in the place of Joseph D. Shafer; two Justices of Sessions, in the place of Thomas Bingham and William Johnson; two Coroners, in the place of Nathaniel J. Lefeaver and John A. Bodley; all whose terms of office will expire on the last day of December next.

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SECTION 2. The moneys realized by such loan shall be applied exclusively to the payment of claims against the state not otherwise provided for, for work done on the Canals of the State, and for private property appropriated by the State for the use of such Canals and for injury to private property growing out of the construction of the Canals, or to the payment of the principal and interest of such loan and for no other purpose whatever.

SECTION 3. Two millions five hundred thousand dollars is hereby appropriated, to be paid out of the treasury, on the warrant of the Auditor of the Canal Department from the said moneys, within two years from the time when this act shall take effect, for the payment of claims against the State specified in the last preceding section, and for the payment of the interest on the loan authorized by this act, which shall become payable prior to the receipt into the treasury of the first annual tax, hereinafter directed to be levied and collected, for the payment of the interest and principal of the loans authorized by this act; but any sum applied to pay interest as aforesaid, may be refunded out of the proceeds of the said taxes when received into treasury.

SECTION 4. An annual tax is hereby imposed, and shall be levied and collected in the same manner as other State taxes are levied and collected, sufficient to pay the interest and redeem the principal of the loan hereby authorized, within the period of eighteen years from the time of contracting thereof. The Comptroller shall ascertain and determine what sum, being applied in payment of principal and interest, in the first year after the tax can be collected as aforesaid, and in each succeeding year thereafter, within the period of eighteen years from the time of contracting said loan, will be sufficient to pay the interest and redeem the principal of said loan within said period of eighteen years; and shall in each year apportion the sum so required among the several counties of this State, according to the then last corrected assessment rolls returned to his office, and shall give notice of such apportionment to the boards of supervisors of the respective counties. It shall be the duty of the boards of supervisors of the respective counties to cause the amount so apportioned in each year to be levied and collected and paid to the Treasurer of this State, in the same manner as other State taxes. The moneys collected and paid into the treasury under this section shall constitute a sinking fund to pay the interest and redeem the principal of the loan contracted pursuant to this act, and shall be sacredly applied to that purpose; and if, at any time, the sinking fund shall be insufficient to comply with the requirements of this section, the Comptroller shall increase the sum thereafter to be levied and collected by the in each year, so as to make the fund adequate for tax purposes aforesaid.

SECTION 5. The fourth section of this act, imposing a tax may be repealed whenever the revenues of the canals, after meeting all present constitutional charges upon them, shall amount to enough to form a sinking fund sufficient to pay the interest and redeem the principal of all loans within the eighteen years mentioned in the first section of this act.

SECTION 6.
