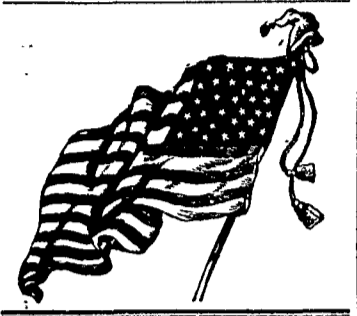

REPUBLICAN CONVENTION.

HEAD-QUARTERS OF THE REPUBLICAN STATE COMMITTEE.

New York, Aug. 16, 1883.

The Republicans of the State of New York are requested to send delegates to a convention to be held at the village of New Rochelle, in the County of Westchester, on Wednesday, Sept. 19, 1883, at 10 o'clock, for the purpose of nominating candidates for State offices, and for the transaction of other appropriate business.

The delegates are to be chosen from Assembly districts, which will be entitled to representation according to the accompanying schedule, pursuant to resolution of the State Convention held July 8, 1883.

Westchester County is entitled to ten delegates appointed as follows: First District, 2; Second District, 3; Third District, 4.

It has long been the custom in this county to pay certain witnesses for the people who attend by subpoena upon the courts and the Grand Jury. The practice has been to pay mileage and \$2 a day. Section 916 of the Code of Criminal Procedure provides that when it appears that a witness has come from another county, or that he is poor, are allowed this compensation. The Court has usually determined who were poor and who were not poor, by personal inquiry, but gradually the Courts became less exacting, until finally every witness began to apply for pay. At the last term of the Supreme Court Judge Bernard drew the line very low, refusing to pay any man who was working and able to support himself. For instance, a man who worked on a farm for \$20 a month and had seven children to support was denied pay for four days attendance. This refusal of the Court to uphold old customs has caused much indignation among present and prospective witnesses. At the present term of the Court of Sessions many subpoenas have been issued to persons who say they will not come. If wanted the Court must bring them. To do this in most cases, will cost the county more than to pay the witnesses. Judge Gifford has therefore decided to make a wider discrimination and pay those who do not own property.

WEST CHESTER.

A SAILBOAT containing three men was capsized off Bay Ridge, N. Y. city Tuesday afternoon. The cries of the men attracted the attention of the captain of Mr. Lorillard's yacht Radia of this place, which was at anchor some distance away from the sailboat. The Radia's yawl was instantly manned and soon afterward the men were rescued. They were taken on board the yacht, and after having their clothes dried were put ashore.

On Thursday afternoon, James Kelly impounded fourteen cows found trespassing on his premises. The owners redeemed the property by paying the penalty fixed by statute, and will probably be more careful in the future.

The case of Robert Kelly against Thomas B. Downer, tried before Justice Bible, Wednesday afternoon and decided in favor of the defendant.

Tennessy McEntyre of Unionport, drives a valuable and fast horse which was owned by the late Rev. Father Maguire, Patrick Mullen has two fine colts which also formed a part of the same estate. Father Maguire died in Paris having executed a will by which almost all his estate was left to the church. His relatives, among whom was Mrs. McEntyre, contested the will and the matter has been compromised, the horses forming a portion of the estate, falling to Mrs. McEntyre.

The Republican caucus was held at the Town Hall, Monday evening, George W. Frost, Thomas Wilson and H. C. Henderson were chosen delegates to the District Convention held on Wednesday, at White Plains.

Last Sunday afternoon two young men from Throggs Neck, rowed over to College Point to visit some ladies and were delayed until after night fall, upon the return trip the wind blew violently and the sea was running quite high. When near the shore the boat capsized and the young men were obliged to swim. They called upon friends living in the vicinity and having obtained dry clothing they found their way home, but were not very communicative if happy.

The soldiers on Fort Schuyler were paid this week and as a consequence appeared unusually happy.

Mattner Coeford lost a valuable horse a few days ago. It is thought that it was stolen from the fields where it was kept.

Lawrence Veltman the boy who dangerously stabbed the son of Justice Jarvis some time ago has been indicted. Young Jarvis has not yet recovered from the effects of the wound but appeared before the Grand Jury.

The premises situate on Throggs Neck, 158 feet on Elliott avenue, by 34 feet on Willow Lane, was sold by Banks and Henderson, attorneys for plaintiff, James Lather, in the foreclosure of a mortgage, to Perry Doherty consideration \$500.

Miss McAcute was appointed to fill vacancy occasioned by resignation of Mrs. H. Devlin, in Primary department of School No. 1.

Isaac Headley, colored, claimed to have been beaten and robbed of a large sum of money at Williams Bridge one night last week. He failed to keep entirely sober, hence the trouble.

A delegate from Empire Engine Co., presented the family of Mr. John T. Gold with a set of beautiful goggles of resoluteion. Mr. Gold was treasurer of the company some years before his death and was a highly esteemed member of the Fire Department.

There seems to be considerable feeling among business men here concerning the number of mails to and from Westchester. A letter mailed here until 6 p. m. there is no out going mail between 8 a. m. to 6 45 p. m.

On Monday last, a horse belonging to Mr. Havemeyer while being driven through the village by one of the farm hands, became frightened and ran away. It dashed along the street at great speed, but fortunately injured no one, and was stopped after one wheel of the wagon had been demolished.
