The President's Latest Card.

The fourth class postoffice appointments now average 100 per day. Admiral Jonett, who has been in the vicinity of Panama for the past three months has been ordered North, with the Tennessee and Yantic, the two remaining vessels of the North Atlantic squadron which were sent to the Isthmus at the beginning of the recent troubles.

A Close Call for Jumbo.

Hon. F. T. Barnum received a letter the other morning from Mr. R. Fish, secretary of the great show, dated St. Johns, N. B., July 5, in which he says that when a few miles over the border in New Brunswick, Jumbo's car was thrown off the track.

The State School Money.

For many years the State school fund has been parcelled out according to a threefold standard. One-third of it is distributed according to the number of teachers in the district, one-third according to the average attendance throughout the school year, and one-third according to the number of persons of school age between 5 and 21 in the district.

Another Russian War Cloud.

According to the latest dispatches, Russian warlike preparations continue unabated, and they have advanced in force to Zulfivar pass. The Afghans are much alarmed. It is believed that General Alkhanoff, the commander of the Russian advance, is determined to precipitate a collision and break up the peace negotiations now in progress.

Horrible Cases of Burning.

Children are Locked in a House and their Remains Found in the Streets. Mrs. Susan Williams, a widow, residing at Atlanta, Ga., locked her three children in while she went to a field to work on Monday. On her return she found her house burned to the ground and nothing left of her children but their charred remains. A similar case also occurred in Gwinnett county, two children being burned to death. In Georgia within the past six months forty little ones lost their lives in the same manner.

A Golden Cannon.

Searching for a Creek for a British Cannon Filled with Gold Believed to be Found. Tradition has it that in the year 1777, when the British army was passing through Comstock's, Washington county, some of the leaders became fearful that they were to be surprised by the enemy. So they filled a large brass cannon with gold, plugged it up and sunk it in the creek about forty rods south of Comstock's. And from that time to the present there have been many different parties at Comstock's in search of this treasure.

They are positive they have found the cannon, but the water at the point is thirteen feet deep, with a strong current, and there seem to be about three feet of sand and dirt over the cannon, besides old logs and other debris, which it will be necessary to remove before anything can be done toward hoisting the cannon, which seems to be bottom side up.

Manning in Hot Water.

The Knights of Labor Take Decided Action on the Question of Convict Labor. A Washington despatch says the Knights of Labor have taken formal action on the decision of Secretary Manning that the bid of the prison contractor can be accepted for furnishing material for a government building, and have appointed a committee to wait upon the President and to protest in the name of the labor organizations against such a policy.

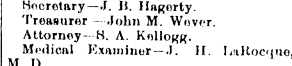

AND IMPROVED SEPARATOR For 1885!

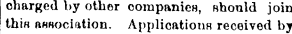
