THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS

At yesterday afternoon's session of the Board of Supervisors, Mr. Hillman, chairman of the committee on supervisors' accounts, and Mr. Dye, chairman of the committee on miscellaneous accounts, made partial reports, which under the rules were laid over for one day.

Mr. Vibbard presented the report of the committee on returned school and highway taxes, of which the following is a summary:
Bleeker, total amount of returned school taxes \$ 76.55
Broadalbin, total amount of returned school taxes 16.13
Caroga, total amount of returned school taxes 167.76
Epitaph, total amount of returned school taxes 54.21
Johnstown, total amount of returned school taxes 127.88
Mayfield, total amount of returned school taxes 93.61
Northampton, total amount of returned school taxes 40.72
Oppenheim, total amount of returned school taxes 100.99
Stratford, total amount of returned school taxes 256.44

Mr. Austin reported on all dogs in the town of Oppenheim, regardless of sex or number, be fixed at the uniform rate of fifty cents each.

By Mr. Leavitt:
Resolved, That there be levied and collected upon the taxable property of the town of Stratford the sum of \$3,451.51 for various purposes. Rate, \$2.30 on a \$100 valuation.

By Mr. Vrooman:
Resolved, That there be levied and collected upon the taxable property of the town of Caroga the sum of \$2,433.69 for various purposes. Rate \$3.47 on a \$100 valuation.

On motion of Mr. Mosher all bills reported at previous sessions were allowed as read.

Mr. Dye introduced a resolution providing for the improvement under the provisions of chapter 115 of the laws of 1895 of that section of the public highway situated within the town of Johnstown, county of Fulton, and described as follows: Beginning at the city line of Gloverville on the road leading from South Kingsboro avenue and running thence southerly to the road leading from the city of Johnstown to Broadalbin, and being a distance of about two miles. Adopted.

Mr. Balje offered a resolution providing for the improvements under the provisions of chapter 115 of the laws of 1895 of that section of the public highway situated within the town of Johnstown in the county of Fulton, and described as follows: Beginning at Bull Run at the bridge at the foot of the hill and running thence north to a point where the Brady road intersects the road herein described, a distance of about one-half mile. Adopted.

Mr. Mosher offered a resolution providing for the improvement, under the provision of chapter 115 of the laws of 1895 of that section of public highway, situated within the county of Fulton and state of New York, described as follows: Beginning at the city limits of the city of Gloverville on Harrison street, and running southerly about one-half mile to the Johnstown and Broadalbin road. Adopted.

Mr. Leavitt offered a resolution favoring the passage of an act that in every town in the forest preserve the supervisor shall be fire warden by virtue of his office. If the supervisor be absent when fires occur, or fall to act, the justice of the peace in the town may act as fire warden, and they shall discharge all the duties devolving upon that office by law, and shall promptly make to the chief fire warden a report of each forest fire that occurs in his town. The resolution requested the member of assembly of this assembly district and the senator of this senatorial district to use their best efforts at the coming session of the legislature to procure such legislation as shall improve the present system.

Mr. Hartin, chairman of the committee on county clerk's accounts, reported back bills referred to his committee without any change.

Resolved, That William Galpin be allowed a compensation of twenty-five dollars as messenger of this board, and the clerk is hereby directed to issue a check therefor.

By Mr. Allen:
Resolved, That the clerk of this board be and he is hereby directed to issue a check to Collins & Combes and George F. Beakley, each for \$41.25, for publishing the official canvass.

By Mr. Allen:
Resolved, That on and after January 1, 1904, the salary of the janitor of the court house and clerk's office be fifty dollars per month, payable monthly.

On motion an adjournment was taken until this morning at 9:30 o'clock.

At the final session of the board today, \$11,200 was voted to pay the county's share of the proposed improved highway between the city of Gloverville and Bull Run.

A resolution was adopted, providing satisfactory terms can be made with the company.

It was voted that the sheriff be allowed \$3.50 per week for the board of prisoners.

The Gloverville Daily Leader and the Morning Herald were designated as official county papers for the coming year.

A resolution was adopted awarding the publication of the proceedings of the board in book form to the Daily Leader.

The sum of \$125 was voted to County Clerk Heagle to reimburse him for expenses in the legal proceedings prior to the last election, and a vote of thanks was extended to Attorney DeWitt C. Moore.

THE SACANDAGA VALLEY.

Six Hundred Pieces of Property to Be Flooded for Proposed Immense Storage Reservoir.

A Glens Falls dispatch says: A lake larger than Lake George, in which enough water can be stored to maintain the Hudson river at a normal height during the low water period, is one of the results which the incorporators of the Hudson River Electric Power company of Queensbury expect will follow the completion of their plans. This company was incorporated yesterday at Albany with a capital of \$1,000,000, having for its purpose the development of the power and resources of the fall of the upper Hudson and the distribution of electric power as far west as Utica and Syracuse and as far south as Hudson.
