**OF LOCAL INTEREST.**

—Barnum's show will exhibit at St. Albans July 30th and at Plattsburgh July 29th.

—Miss Byrd, a guest at Paul Smith's, was drowned Monday from a row boat, in which were two other ladies.

—At Kirkwood, Del., July 4th, with a running mate to make the pace for him, John Hamlin's Ayers, a Long Island horse, reeled off a mile in 2.08— a mark never before reached in the history of the light harness racer. He made the quarters in 6.31, 1.02, 1.32, 2.03.

—The following paste will whiten the hands and arms. Four ounces of strained honey, two ounces of yellow wax, six ounces of rose water and an ounce of myrrh. Melt the wax, honey and rose water together in a dish over boiling water. When melted (and hot add the myrrh. Stir until smooth. Apply to the skin before retiring.

—It is noticeable that while there are many failures in the West, the failures in the South are comparatively few. The stringency in the South, after the great cotton crop of 1891-92, restricted credit and caused business to go on a cash basis. This has prepared the South for the present crisis, and to a certain extent has been a blessing.

The New York World publishes reports from 500 localities in the West and Northwest, showing the condition of the crops. It is shown that the wheat crop will be much below the average. It is said the corn crop will be enormous and that the acreage of oats, barley, rye and similar grains has increased, and that the crops will be large. Everwhere the hay crop is above the average. The fruit crop is generally poor and in many cases a failure. The general condition in the agricultural section is said to be good.

—A disease broke out last week among the horses in the town of Harrisburgh, near Louisville, which proved fatal in each case inside of twenty four hours. The local physicians treated the horses with no effect. Dairy Commissioner, Fred Schraub was notified, and he immediately summoned the assistance of state experts, M. J. Henderson of Syracuse, and T. E. Gottlieb, of Utica, accompanied by Com. Schraub with several citizens drove to Harrisburgh. The oxen returned the same evening, and to the correspondent Mr. Henderson said: "The history of the trouble dates back to last winter, when a farmer lost 12 sheep and three cows. The carcasses of these animals were not buried, and during the months that have followed the flies have fed upon them, and disease has been transmitted to the horses by inoculation from the flies. At Mr. Edgell's farm we found two horses afflicted with it, at Frank Wheeler's one horse, at Patrick Vaughn's two, and at Samuel Roberts' one cow. Mr. Roberts lost two cows last week. We found the sanitary conditions on the Edgell farm in very bad shape. Carcasses of dead animals had been left to decompose on top of the earth, and a large cesspool exists back of the barn. Here is a warning to many farmers who have been negligent in the matter of sanitary conditions about their premises, and should be observed.

When the package was opened yesterday afternoon it was found to contain a piece of three-quarter inch round iron, about one inch and a quarter long, carefully packed in cotton. Worden is \$2.50 ahead—the house \$3 behind by the transaction.


