Then again, upon the prosperity of your home village depends the valuation of your farm - Exchange.

Petty swindlers have been working a new dodge in neighboring towns. to withdraw public money from any district willfully disobeying any order, decision, etc.

2. Hereafter the school year shall be 180 days of school including all legal holidays occurring during the term, and also institute week, but not including Saturdays, and no school shall be in session holidays.

3. Annual school meetings to be held on fourth Tuesday of August.

4. District school officers to be elected by ballot.

5. The district clerk, under a penalty of \$5, must report the names of officers elected at school meeting to the town clerk.

6. Upon all propositions arising at district meetings involving the expenditure of money or levy of tax, the vote thereon must be by ballot or ascertained by taking and recording the ayes and noes.

7. Trustees to make reports to school commissioners this year, between July 25 and August 1, dated July 26; in each year thereafter to make such reports on August 1, such reports to cover the month of August of the preceding year.

8. Annual meeting of boards of education of every union free school district, shall be held on the first Tuesday of September in each year.

CHEAP EXCURSION

To World's Fair, Via New York Central, July 29th, 1893.

On Saturday, July 29th, the first of the special World's Fair day coach excursions will be run from all points on the New York Central (Adirondack division) to Chicago at the very low rate of eighteen dollars (\$18.00) for the round trip. Tickets will be good on the Adirondack Division day train No. 53 leaving Malone at 10:00 a. m. and special excursion train on the main line due to pass Herkimer at 4:35 p. m., and scheduled to arrive in Chicago at 4:00 p. m. the following day. Tickets cover passage in day coach only and are available for return passage from Chicago only on trains leaving that city via Michigan Central R. R. at 3:10 and 7:50 p. m. (Central time) on or before August 7th, 1893. No stop over will be allowed. The special train from Herkimer West will consist of handsome new vestibuled day coaches, and if sufficiently well patronized, these coaches will be run through without change to Chicago. Clubs, societies, organizations or special parties will be assigned special coaches if forty five or more passengers in the party. Those intending to patronize this excursion should purchase their tickets at once.
