WILLIAM FOREST BROWN
William Forest Brown, 92 former resident of Indian Lake died Friday afternoon in the Maynard Convalescent Home in Johnstown where he had been a patient for eight weeks.

He was born August 16, 1855 in Hamilton County where he has resided all his life. For many years he served as a guide and was well known throughout the county.

His wife, Mrs. Ellen Arnold Brown, died some years ago.
The survivors are one brother, Sylvester Brown of Speculator, and several nieces, nephews and cousins.

Funeral services were held on Sunday afternoon at 1:30 at the Lipe Funeral Home in Northville. The Rev. John G. Robinson of the Wells Methodist church officiated. Burial was made in the cemetery at Indian Lake.
