OTHER COUNTIES. WITHIN THE LINES OF THE OLD EMPIRE STATE. And an abridgement of some interesting matters and cases. Our readers will remember the horrible catastrophe which Mrs. Ellen Taylor lost her life by the burning of her house on Oak Hill, occasioned by the explosion of a kerosene lamp; the investigation by Mr. Albert Colby of the State Board of Health, the coroner's inquest, and the collection from the merchant of samples of oil which were analyzed and found to be of the best quality. A man of all this Newman J. Noble, who for some time has supplied the local dealers with oil, was arrested on Wednesday on charge of selling oil below the test specified by law, it being alleged that he sold the oil to Dolan, who sold it to Mrs. Gay. The case, which is a test case, will be presented by District Attorney North and defended by Hon. Geo. Brown. The coroner's inquest, which was held in the first, second and fourth courts of the County of Orleans, was a very interesting one. The metal was out by hand in India for Louis O. Another Stage Accident. Scarcely had the public ceased to discuss with interest the shooting of Anna Von Bohlen by Frank Fey on the stage of a theatre in Cincinnati when it was again startled last Tuesday night by the shooting of Miss Lillian Spencer by Arthur H. Forrest upon the stage of the Corinthian Academy in Rochester. The participants of the sad accident are as follows: Miss Spencer was playing "Gone" and Mr. Forrest, "George Darnel," in the emotional play of "Artful 47." The plot of the piece hangs upon shooting of Gora by Duhanal at the close of the first act. The weapon usually used for this purpose was a toy revolver and blank cartridges were exploded. This had become mislaid and in its place a Harrington & Richardson seven-shot revolver of 44 calibre was used, being loaded with blank cartridges, two of which exploded, blowing their contents into Miss Spencer's face and ear. The accident was more painful than dangerous, but nevertheless suggests the propriety of restricting the playing by the safety of the actors engaged in it. Familiarity with fire arms usually breeds contempt of the danger involved in handling them and for that reason it would be well for the safety of both the actors and audience if it could not be done they should be furnished with the magazine and the audience led to imagine what in reality is a shock to the strongest nerves.
