ROAD JOBS IN VILLAGE APPROVED

WPA Projects Planned for \$18,886 for Local Street Work

A WPA project totaling \$18,886.85 for new highway construction and repair in Newark this summer was approved by the Village Board in monthly meeting Tuesday night. The job is being submitted by LeRoy H. Wright, superintendent of public works, under the blanket WPA project of \$334,630 set up by village and federal authorities five years ago.

Wright said this year's plans call for final blacktop and grading on Elmwood and Moore streets and installing a gravel base and bituminous treatment preparatory to paving on Washington St. and Church St. between Hoffman and the Pennsylvania Railroad. In addition, several sections of concrete curbing will be removed and replaced on South Main and East Union streets.

The board also received the declination of George W. Doty to accept the post of Third Assistant Fire Chief, to which he was elected by Fire Department delegates April 3. The matter was referred to the Fire Council for action. Clifford B. Sanford was re-appointed village assessor and new uniforms approved for the two paid fire drivers.

Deluge Hose Co. formally offered a new emergency squad car, which is financed and outfitted to the board for village use, and it was accepted. A permit was granted Ivan DeMay to build a one-story cinder block blacksmith shop and garage on Water St. to replace one which burned this Spring. Plans call for a structure 70 by 96 feet.

Annual village tax levy for 1941-42, amounting to \$116,168.70, was ordered to be collected from June 2 through July 1. Tax rate will be \$17.49 a thousand, according to Village Treasurer J. Elbert Fisk. The board also levied the final one-fifth of unpaid paving taxes and interest, totaling \$4,091.37 this year, and unpaid curbing taxes on West Sherman and West Avenue amounting to \$1,042.55. Police Chief Schereers reported 79 arrests during April, including 30 for overtime parking, and Police Justice M. E. Livingston reported \$161 collected in fines.

State Welfare Aide Urges Well Defined Social Program

Private social agencies have a big job to do that public welfare agencies cannot take care of either because of limitation by law or pressure of work, according to Perry J. Gangloff, superintendent of Social Work, State Department of Social Welfare.

Principal speaker at the annual dinner meeting of the Arcadia Family Welfare Society Tuesday night at the Country Club, Gangloff stressed the need of the private social agency to deal with social problems which have developed in families throughout the depression.

At the business meeting preceding the talk, Mrs. E. B. Elliott, the Rev. Charles W. Walker, the Rev. J. J. Ganey, J. V. Eickella and E. G. Howard were re-elected directors for three-year terms, and Mrs. Harrison Bloomer was elected as a new director for a similar term, on nomination of Ralph Smith, chairman of the nominating committee.

Miss Eilda Sheppard, local executive secretary, gave a report, and the Rev. Charles W. Walker, society president, who presided, gave a brief talk in which he lauded the work of Family Societies, and introduced guests and workers who have contributed to the local program during the year.

Included among guests were Elmer J. Butts, county welfare commissioner; G. Fred Monroe, Town of Arcadia welfare officer; Mrs. Blythe Francis, executive secretary of the Rochester Family Society, and ministers of the local churches.

Mr. Gangloff's talk in brief, follows:

"In this day of confusion and uncertainty, cooperation must be our watchword, if our social services are to survive and give the best measure of service to the clients who seek their aid. By experience we have come to find that both public and private agencies have a real place in the community program.

"Based on the social welfare law, the public agency is charged with the responsibility of providing for the needs of those who are unable to provide for themselves. This is a big job, but one that has been handled amazingly efficiently by the public welfare agencies in Wayne County and throughout New York State. But even public agencies have their limitations because of the pressure of work and the size of staffs. The public agency has found that most of its time and energy
