

# Satellites Carry Telephone Calls to Parts of Europe

Telephone calls to Europe and the Pacific. But satellites are just beginning to test their voices across the globe. According to New York Telephone manager Allen D. Horning, service will be available before long to Africa, South America, the Middle East and Asia. The construction of new ground sta-

tions in these distant lands and the launching of higher-capacity satellites will make this expansion possible.

Some of the countries planning to open ground stations within the next few years are Nigeria, Morocco, Argentina, Brazil, India, Pakistan, Greece, Singapore and Korea. Stations will be opened this summer in Panama and Chile. At this time ground stations are being built in West Virginia, California and Puerto Rico. They will be used in conjunction with the 1,200-circuit Intelsat facilities planned for launching later this year.

"This expansion of satellite facilities will make additional overseas circuits available and it will enable us to improve the quality of telephone service to some areas now reached only via high frequency radio," Horning said.

"Satellites, operating alongside high quality cables, are making it as easy to call around the world as around the corner."

The Bell System, which is the world's largest commercial user of satellite facilities, operates about 250 satellite circuits to route calls to and from the United States. It anticipates that more than 2,000 satellite circuits will be needed in the early 1970s. In fact, a point will be reached in the next decade when satellite circuits carrying overseas conversations will outnumber cable circuits.

AT&T's Long Lines Department, which is the Bell System's overseas and interstate operating unit, leases satellite circuits from the Communications Satellite Corporation (Comsat) for handling calls between the United States and points abroad.

The Bell System, which pioneered in space communications with its successful Telstar experiment in 1962, maintains a continuing interest in the field. Its engineers, working closely with Comsat engineers, are involved with various facets of satellite operations.

These include technical designs for ground stations and to connect the stations to the nation's domestic network. AT&T, the Bell System's parent company, is part owner of the stations in the continental United States.

Another subject of mutual interest is the future use of satellites for domestic communications. Comsat has offered a proposal for a pilot domestic satellite system. Similar in many respects to a plan developed by the Bell System, it is being reviewed by the Federal Communications Commission.

"Satellites, a product of the space age, have already proven their importance in overseas communications," Horning said. "They will in the future prove equally useful in domestic communications."

## No Breath to Spare

Every five years—three times since 1950—the number of deaths per year has doubled. That's the gloomy record set by a disease that, a short while back, few people had ever heard of. The disease is emphysema, an impairment of the lungs that shortens the breath.

Increasing deaths are not the whole story of the growth in emphysema cases. It's a disease that's slow and insidious in its attack. When shortness of breath starts, and then gets slowly worse, the victim may not realize for months or even years what's going on. But in time he may have to cut down on his activities and get along doing less work, less play, less getting around.

That may go on for years, too. Lots of disabled people owe their disability to shortness of breath caused by emphysema. It's second only to heart disease as a cause of disability payments in the Health Association of Wayne County.

Doctors don't know what causes emphysema, though they suspect cigarette smoking may play a part, and the polluted air we breathe doesn't help. There is no cure for lung damage once it happens. But doctors can help an emphysema victim live with his disease and keep functioning up to the top of his abilities.

Better not ignore the situation if you suddenly realize you're a lot more short of breath than you used to be. For example, if you now find yourself gasping at the top of a flight of stairs you formerly took in your stride. If that happens, get your doctor to check on the possibility of emphysema. He can help in many ways. For more information, ask
