APPLE PIE

2 c flour
1 c shortening (Crisco)
or 2/3 c lard
1 tsp salt
1 1/2 c sweet milk
1 tbs vinegar

Blend shortening and flour with
salt. Add milk and
vinegar. Roll out on floured
board.

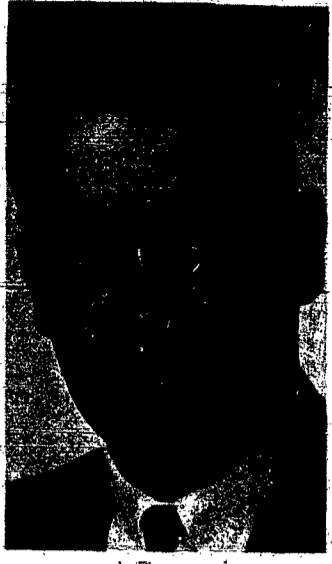
Filling:
4 apples, Greenings, sliced
very thin
1/3 c sugar
1/4 tsp nutmeg
1 tbs flour
1 tbs butter

Put all thoroughly and pour
over crust. Place top crust and
seal. Bake at 450, reduce tem-
perature to 350 and bake 20 min-
utes.

Mrs. Charles Wilke won third
place for her apple pie. She
used the same piecrust recipe
as Mrs. Taylor does but uses
1/2 c salt. She fills the pie
with sliced apples then
pours over the syrup which
boils for 10 minutes before
pouring the top crust:

1/2 c brown sugar
1/2 c white sugar
2 tbs flour
1 tbs butter
3/4 tsp cinnamon
1/4 c water

Melt the butter, add flour and
salt, add rest of ingredients.

Sybil Shearer Receives Rave Review for Recital

Sybil Shearer danced before a standing-room only audience in her recent recital at the National College of Education's Arnold Auditorium.

The former Newark resident who is an artist in residence at the college, received rave reviews in the February issue of the "News", the college magazine.

Miss Shearer came to Newark with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. John Porter Shearer, from Amityville, L.I., when her father, a Mehle specialist, became associated with the old Bloomer Bros. Company in 1924. She had studied the dance before coming to Newark and continued her studies under Grace Miles of Lyons. After her graduation from Newark High School in 1930, she attended Skidmore College then studied in a dance school in New York City. There she, in association with Agnes DeMille, started their own dance troupe.

One of her earliest performances, in Newark was in the old gymnasium, now the Community Center, where she performed to a record player. In January 1944, sponsored by the Newark Business and Professional Women's Club, she gave a recital in the present Junior High School auditorium. She has appeared as a soloist on a half hour TV program, but the dream of every artist came true with her appearance as a soloist at Carnegie Hall in 1941.

She appears in dancing pose on the cover of the Dance Observer in Jan. 1961 and is listed as a dancer-teacher at Winnetka Community Theatre, Winnetka, Ill. with her residence at Northbrook, Ill.

Miss Shearer's dances are extremely modern and is called the Charles Ives of the modern dance, having pre-invented most

of the prevalent off-beat practices. The titles of her dances are always unique, such as "The Dear should not vie with the flower", "Santitas doesn't quibble", "Stamping won't dent the world", "Close the door lest you heat the universe", "A pretty basket can remain empty", "Wheels make walking passe", "The sunbeam will outlast us all". These titles were taken from a program called "Fables and Proverbs."

Representing the American Modern Dance, Miss Shearer appears in a film of solo dance in "The Dance and the Film" presented by the British Film Institute. Other artists in the same presentation are: Anna Pavlova, Concert of Stars, U.S.S.R., Fred Astaire.

Miss Shearer was said to "reverse a trend in 1960 by turning her back on a considerable reputation in New York to put down her artistic roots in the middle of the country. . . . She fell a growing decentralization, liked the prairies, felt the fertility of the land, and settled in the country near Chicago."

Prior to Miss Shearer's appearance at Carnegie Hall she had been a prominent member of the Humphrey Weidman Company before appearing for two years with Agnes de Mille. In 1942 she received the "Years Dance Award" of the New York Times.

The page review in the N.C.E. News said, "The Chicago Daily News states, 'Miss Shearer's origins in modern dance are evident in her work, but her inspiration seems to be divinely her own. She is one of a kind, a rare bird whose flight is singular in its grace and style'."

Her pixie sense of humor is remarked in another review. While it is said she could make her fortune in big time, she prefers her suburban refuge; her

2 c flour

Blend shortening and flour with salt. Add milk and vinegar. Roll out on floured board.

1/3 c sugar

1 tbs flour
1 tbs butter

Put all thoroughly and pour over crust. Place top crust and seal. Bake at 450, reduce temperature to 350 and bake 20 minutes.

MOLASSES COOKIES

1/2 c sugar
1/2 c butter
1/2 c molasses
1/2 tsp salt

Mix above together. Add 1 beaten egg
1/2 c boiling water with 1 tsp soda
3 c sifted all purpose flour with 1 tbs baking powder.
1/2 tsp each ginger, cinnamon, nutmeg

Place dough in refrigerator over night before rolling out on floured canvas or heavy dish towel. Bake at 350 for 12 min.

MOLASSES COOKIES
3/4 c shortening
1 c sugar
1 egg and 1 egg yolk
1/4 c molasses
2 c flour plus 1/2 c flour
2 tsp baking soda
1/4 tsp cloves and ginger
1 tsp cinnamon
1/2 tsp salt
2 tbs milk soured with 1 tsp vinegar

Chill thoroughly before rolling and cutting. The Grange required the cookies to be 3 inches in diameter. Bake at 350 for 10 min.

Keuka College To Offer 6-Week Summer Course

A six-week summer institute for classroom teachers who want to identify and work with perceptually handicapped youngsters in regular classrooms will be held at Keuka College June 29 to August 7.

Some 40 teachers from a ten-county area will be eligible for the program, approved by the State Education Department. They will work with 20 perceptually handicapped children to develop a working knowledge of the general approaches, curricula, and methods which have been found beneficial for the perceptually handicapped.

Teachers from school districts in Genesee, Livingston, Monroe, Ontario, Orleans, Seneca, Steuben, Wayne, Wyoming, and Yates counties are eligible to attend. A stipend of \$360 will be paid to resident participants; commuters will receive a \$60 allowance.
