

## Police and Sheriff Dept. Reports

### Newark Police

**Cashime Myers, 25**, was arrested Tuesday on a warrant for first-degree criminal contempt of a court order. The complaint says he threatened to kill his girlfriend, and yelled obscenities outside of her mother's home. Myers is in jail in lieu of \$5000/\$10,000.

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## Sybil Shearer - dance pioneer, dies at age 93

Sybil Louise Shearer, Newark native, modern dance pioneer and writer, died Nov. 17, 2005 at her home in Northbrook, Illinois. She would have been 94 in February.

Born in Toronto, she was a 1930 graduate of Newark's Washington High School, the only child of the late John P. and Constance Shearer, who lived at 107 Grant Street (current home of Holly and Gil Burgess).

She began her dancing career as a student of the late Helen Nye (later Helen Drake), who operated a school of the dance on High Street. After her high school graduation, Miss Shearer enrolled at Skidmore College in Saratoga Springs. In the absence of a dance major, she studied drama and literature.

By her senior year, she decided to be a creator in a field that combined dance and theater. That decision took her to Bennington College, then a center of modern dance. She was captivated by modern dance, and for Shearer this became an all encompassing focus for the rest of her life.

In February 2005, on the eve of her 93rd birthday, she performed one of her legendary solos "Flame" at the Art Institute in Chicago.

"Although she was 93, she could still suggest much of the magic that those who saw her in her heyday (when she was a wild beauty) remember," said Estelle Spector, head of the musical program at Columbia College, and a longtime friend of Shearer.

After college, she danced with the Humphrey-Weidman dance group in New York and was an assistant choreographer with the legendary Agnes deMille. Performing a solo recital at Carnegie Hall in 1941, she drew critical acclaim.

She returned to Newark and introduced the community to esthetic, classical dancing, before a crowd of 800 at the downtown Capitol Theatre. Dancing alone, she demonstrated her skill as an artist and actress, through the use of pantomime. Miss Shearer created her own dances and personally designed the costumes. After the recital, she left her home town for good.

The war years found her on the faculty of the new Roosevelt University in Chicago. She had left New York City and would never enjoy the fame of such peers as Martha Graham or Merce Cunningham.

It was at Roosevelt that she began a 40-year collaboration with lighting director and film archivist Helen Balfour Morrison. When Morrison died in 1984, Shearer established the Morrison-Shearer Foundation and Museum at the home and studio she maintained in Northbrook, a residence designed by the great landscape architect Jens Jansen. She taught thousands of children in her schools, and for many years was artist in residence at the National College of Education's Arnold Theater in Evanston, Illinois. The Sybil Shearer Dance Company was formed in Chicago in 1952.

The foundation will be the beneficiary of her estate, according to Alida Szabo, a trustee of the Morrison-Shearer Foundation.

Sybil Shearer was in contact with this newspaper in July, speaking about the upcoming publication of her three-volume autobiography *Without Wings the Way is Steep*, with the first volume entitled *Within This Thicket*.

Szabo said, "The foundation will undertake the completion of her autobiography and be charged with her property, which will become a museum for her papers and photographs, and eventually a place for contemplation and study for artists."

A tribute service will be held at the Art Institute of Chicago on Saturday, February 5.

## Oaks backs Pataki

Assemblyman Robert Oaks spoke out in support of Gov. George Pataki's proposed Illegal Gun-Trafficking and Crimes Against Law Enforcement Officers bills during a press conference last week.

"Cop killers and illegal gun dealers belong behind bars, not out on probation where they may strike again," said Oaks. "When New York City police officers Dillon Stewart and Daniel Enchautegui were murdered in cold blood, it underscored the need for stronger laws that punish criminals who possess or sell illegal guns."

New York City police officers confiscate an average 3,500 illegal firearms per year. Since 1995, almost 1,900 officers have been assaulted by criminals wielding illegal firearms. The message was echoed by law enforcement professionals and members of the Assembly minority across New York state.

## Still too many people driving drunk

Dr. Jeffrey Runge, head of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), was quoted in an AP story as saying that, "Since the early 1990s, we haven't made any progress, regarding effectively reducing drunk driving in the United States."

There were 17,000 alcohol-related fatalities in each of the last three years, according to the NHTSA. With roughly 14 million people in the country currently addicted to alcohol and millions more displaying symptoms of abuse, the number of casualties is not surprising.

The same AP story said Runge was pushing for funding for states to develop more drunk driving courts with special prosecutors and judges. There are currently a few of such courts in the United States.

The intent to focus on one singular issue seems to have been successful, much like the idea of drug courts and their surge in popularity and effectiveness.

One key to the success of such programs in the court system is effective rehabilitation for the addicts. This is an essential component, whether the individual is sentenced to outpatient or residential treatment.
