This report comes from the American Bankers Association and may be relied upon as absolutely correct. That the "dollar down and a dollar a week" policy bears remarkable fruits when applied to the Christmas Club saving scheme will be particularly and joyfully evident to the five million depositors. The first Christmas Club in Fairport was inaugurated one year ago by the Fairport National bank. This week they are mailing to one hundred members Christmas Club checks amounting to \$2,500. From the above it will be seen that the Christmas Club plan helps the depositor, the bank and business men in all avenues of trade.
