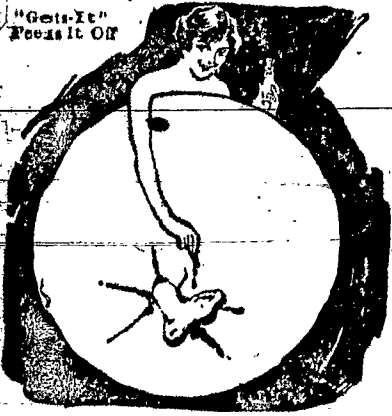

# KNOX SPEECH IN SENATE IS CAMPAIGN MATERIAL

Shows There Are Three Factions in the Treaty Fight—The Irreconcilables and the Reservationists in the Republican Party With the Democrats Solidly Behind the President

Washington, D. C., May 7.—President Wilson has waited in silence for the men who defeated the treaty of Versailles in the Senate to offer an alternative course of action. Senator Philander C. Knox, former Secretary of State, and Republican leader, a member of the group irreconcilably opposed to the treaty with or without reservations, has spoken in defense of the plan to make peace by Congressional resolution.

Insofar as this brings out at least the lines of battle, it marks a step forward toward the great contest at the polls where the issue will be decided, insofar as it emphasizes the hopeless deadlock between the executive and legislative branches of the government, it breathes anew the passion of personal strife and party bitterness which has prevented agreement for so long.

The Pennsylvania Senator's speech made a deep impression. It was carefully prepared and skillfully paced to arouse criticism—an analysis of what had been done, what was being done, what would be done if the concrete or general plan for action in the face of today's situation beyond a vague suggestion for an international conference some day where in Europe arrangements shall be prepared.

But Senator Knox makes an honest presentation of the viewpoint of the irreconcilables. He doesn't take refuge behind the cry for "proper reservations." He brushes aside as "untrue" all the talk about Americanizing the treaty with reservations, indulging in the words of Messrs. Lowden, Harding, Wood, Will Hays and others. He defines the issue as Hiram Johnson has so persuasively put it in his successful primary campaign. He is against the whole treaty and the league.

There is the most interesting paragraph in the speech. "It has been said that reservations proposed in the Senate Americanize the league," Knox says. "A more accurate statement of the effect of those reservations is that they tend to make it impossible for America to enter the league by consenting to be bound in many important matters by its action."

It is not enough that the league shall be made safe for America; it must be made safe for all who enter it and safe to the world. As I see it nothing could be fraught with more danger than any nation having a special interest relation to a league where the other members are subject to the dangers attendant upon the immune nation.

The foregoing is exactly what President Wilson has contended in his position to reservations and will explain to the historian of the future why Senator Knox and the irreconcilables work hard to avert flu epidemic.

## INTERNATIONAL MARRIAGE POOL IS SUGGESTED

Europe Has Surplus of Women Who Will Never Find Husbands

Paris, May 7.—The startling proposal that an international marriage pool be formed to provide for the repopulating of Europe and the salvation of the white races of the world was made today by Professor Paul Carnot, famous member of the faculty of medicine of the University of Paris.

Europe, he declared, has a surplus of millions of women for whom there never will be husbands unless some arrangement can be made to have them marry outside their own countries. The whole future of the white race, he asserted, is bound up in the problem.

"The last census figures," said Dr. Carnot, "showed a great surplus of males over females in the United States. We have millions of surplus women. Then why not a Franco-American bureau to facilitate the marriage of American men with the girls of France, where the war left such a shortage of men? Why not a Franco-Argentine bureau, a Franco-Australian bureau, in short why not a great international bureau where each country may make known its human needs and provide facilities for courtship and eventual marriage?"

"We, on the Allied side, pooled our supplies of munitions to win the war. We pooled our shipping, we pooled our finance and finally we pooled our manly strength. Why not pool our manly strength to win the peace? Why not pool their greatest of all productive resources so that civilization itself may not perish?"

"Supreme councils and ambassadors of France, where the war left such a shortage of men? Why not a Franco-Argentine bureau, a Franco-Australian bureau, in short why not a great international bureau where each country may make known its human needs and provide facilities for courtship and eventual marriage?"

"In the Far East, in China and Japan, hordes of yellow people are constantly multiplying until we hear talk of a 'yellow peril' that will inundate white civilization."

"In the United States and other civilized countries that suffered little loss of man power in the war the birth rate is falling off and apparently nothing is being done about it. Europe, staggering to her feet from the wounds of war, confronts a problem of repopulation with an excess of between 15,000,000 and 20,000,000 women over men."

"I have suggested the recruiting of a volunteer army of maternity, an organization of women who could agree to bear babies to repopulate de-
