HARVARD OARSMEN DEFEAT YALE BY SIX LENGTHS IN VARSITY RACE

Crimson Administers Crushing Defeat to Elis in Principal Event of New London Regatta, Yale Crew Finishing in Pitiful State—Yale Wins Preliminary Contests

New London, Conn., June 26—Leading from the initial dip of their oars, Harvard's varsity crew defeated Yale in a spectacular four-mile race late yesterday by nearly six lengths.

Rowing in magnificent form, the start of the long upstream battle, the oarsmen coached by Bill Haines early demonstrated their superiority in blade work and stamina, and swept across between the finish flags twenty-three minutes and eleven seconds after the starting signal.

The victory of the Harvard eight came as more or less of a surprise, for Yale was a favorite at odds of 10 to 7 in the little betting that was done.
