## Nursery School Now In Session

On Wednesday, September 12th, the Perinton Co-operative Nursery School opened its doors for the first full session of its fifth year. Its classes are held in two freshly painted rooms in the Crossman Community Center. There

are 18 four year olds, who are taught by Carol Ely on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Thursdays. The 14 three year olds are taught by Carol Dietrich on Tuesdays and Fridays. Classes last from 9:30 a.m. until noon. Two mothers assist each morning.

The children have many interesting things to do, such as play with large hollow blocks, sturdy trucks, tools, and a variety of small toys and puzzles. There is also a housekeeping corner, book corner, and large play house. Many creative materials are enjoyed by the pupils, such as painting, finger painting, collage work, and modeling clay or play dough. There are a story-time, rest-time, juice-time, and music included in the schedule. In fair weather some time is spent playing on the outdoor playground.

The nursery school would like to obtain some inexpensive used tricycles in good condition. There is one opening left for a three year

### Water Lease Oked

Final contracts to lease the Town's water system to the Monroe County Water Authority has been made official. The lease runs for forty years and becomes effective within 30 days.

The lease may be upset if water district residents petition for a referendum. Such a move is doubtful, according to local sources.

## Ox Bow May Be Doomed

County Health Authorities may have sounded the death knell for the Oxbow. Last week they issued an order of cease and desist covering the claim that the Oxbowites were dumping raw sewage into the Barge Canal.

The community on the edge of the widewaters of the canal at Hulburt Rd. is composed of some fifty-four cottages, many adapted to year round use and still others unoccupied. Originally it was a summer community.

The Town Board was unaware of the County's move until Oxbow residents petitioned the town to build sanitary sewers to the section.

According to authorities there is no room for septic tank leach fields and the residents have little choice but to pipe their sanitary facilities into canal waters.

Although the area is outside Fairport's corporate limits Village officials had recently expressed concern about the appearance and condition of many of the cottages.

Oxbow residents do not own the land. It is State property and leased to them. The health department stated that unless residents discontinued disposing of raw sewage into the canal their State leases would be cancelled, and tenants obliged to move. October first was given as the deadline.

Perinton Town Board members were of the opinion that it was unlikely that sanitary sewers would be constructed unless the State provided the financing.

The 1962-63 Swimming Pool Program at the Minerva DeLand High School pool opens this week with a family swim night this Saturday evening, September 22 starting at 7:00 P.M. The use of the pool is reserved for residents of the school district. A fee is charged to pay for the life guards needed to properly supervise the activity. The schedule follows:

## "Paisanos" Prep For the Big Day

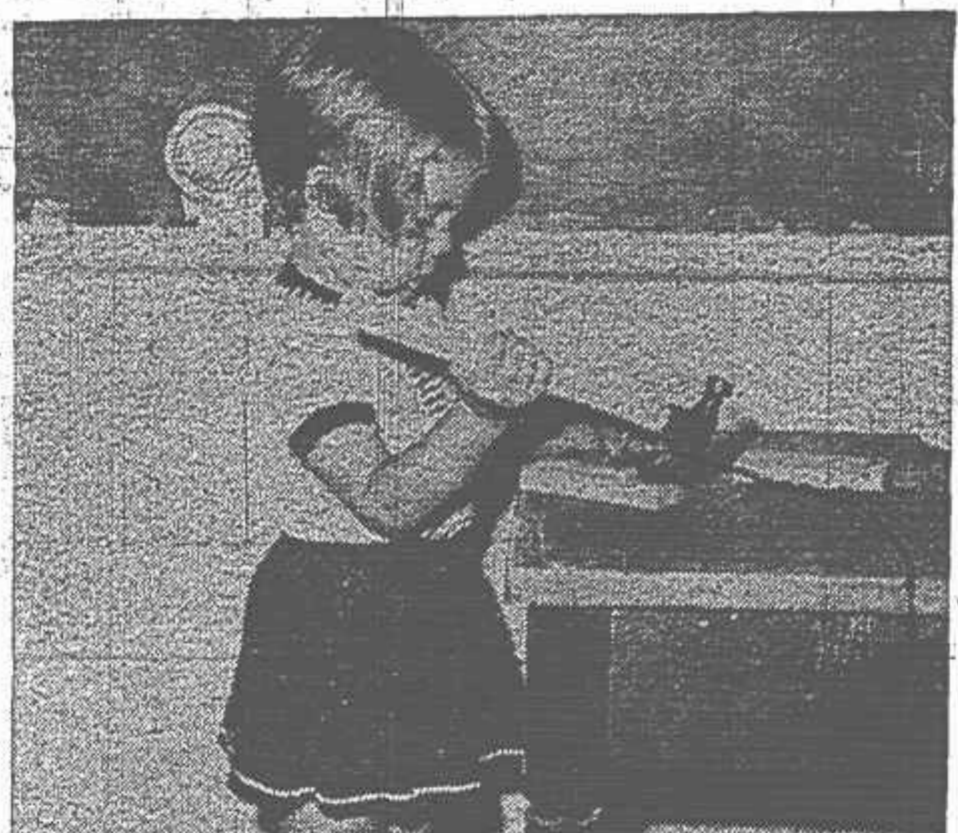
