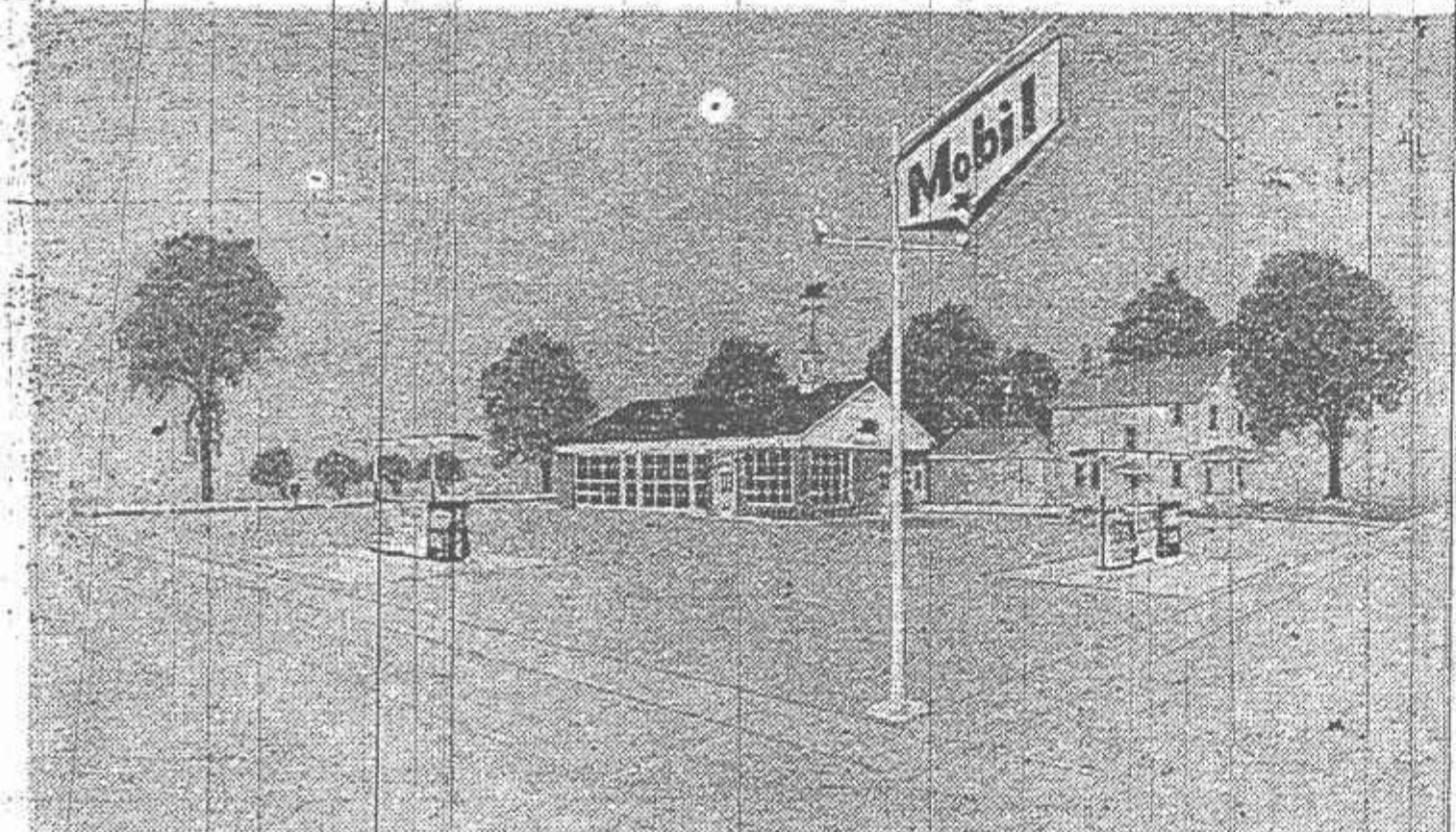

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Forefather's Day Observance Urged

It is proposed by your town historian, that there be town-wide observance of May 20th as Forefather's Day; that the representative, (Sesquicentennial Committee) for each church, suggest that a sheet of history be enclosed in the church bulletin, stating why that date and this year should be observed.

On May 26, 1812, the Legislature of the State of New York passed this act: "That from and after the first Monday in April next, all that part of the town of Boyle, in the county of Ontario, aforesaid, known and distinguished by township number twelve, in the fourth range of townships in said county, is hereby erected into a separate town, by the name of Perinton; and that the first town-meeting shall be held at the house of Cyrus Packard, in said town," Monroe County was not established until 1821.

Included also, perhaps inside this sheet, could be a brief history of that church, compiled from abundant material available, by a student member, above his or her name. A picture or sketch of each church would be fine.

A copy of an Anniversary Hymn is being distributed which, with old church hymns and music might be included in a program to be quite generally used. Before 1800 were the hymns Come Thou Almighty King and Awake, My Soul. Old Hundredth was written about 1551.

Starting Saturday, May 12th the people of The Town of Perinton have their choice of accepting regular money or now legal wooden nickels in change at cooperating business places. Any business place or individual wishing to redeem their wooden nickels for cash may do so at the Security Trust Co. of Rochester, Fairport Branch thru July 27th, 1962. However, it is expected that these nickels will be souvenir pieces for local people and also folks coming back during the celebration week of July 25th thru 29th.

The Sesquicentennial Committee has had these wooden nickels struck off in five different colors and everyone will want a complete set to keep as a Souvenir of this 150th Birthday Anniversary of The Town of Perinton. It is suggested you get your set early as the initial order has been set at a limited number. These wooden nickels sent to old friends and relatives will be appreciated in many years to come.
