

New Faces For Emergency Crew

Two new faces recently added to the Fayetteville Volunteer Fire Dept's Ambulance Unit are Ann Chase and Kathy Cook, the first two women to contribute their services during the day when most volunteers are unavailable.

Miss Cook who joined the ambulance crew in April, works at the Fayetteville Home Fair where her employers allow her to leave to answer calls. She is also on the Manlius ambulance crew with her husband Larry Cook Jr. and has always wanted to be a nurse. This was the next best thing.

She finds the work satisfying and the reaction to a woman fireman very positive. They don't treat me

any differently than any one else," she says.

Mrs. Chase, who was appointed to the fire department in June, is a wife and mother who has lived in Fayetteville most of her life.

She has taught cardiopulmonary resuscitation at the Fayetteville fire house and saw volunteer ambulance work as an ideal opportunity to "help out" while her children attend Fayetteville elementary and Wellwood schools during the day.

She lives with her husband and their three children at 302 N. Manlius St., Fayetteville.

Both women have taken the extensive 81 hour emergency medical technician course and have passed the New York State exam.

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Neighbors Question Verbeck Proposal

Manlius neighbors of the proposed Verbeck residential development project on the former Manlius Military Academy voiced their concerns about the project at a two hour public hearing before the Manlius Town Planning Board Monday.

Michael Sutton, architect for the project, and Edward Dietrich, attorney for the developer, answered questions from the group of approximately 50 residents.

Don Cortese, 8062 Cazenovia Rd. expressed concern for the traffic problems which already exist and which, he feels, will be made worse by the additional traffic from the new residences.

He felt that traffic controls and speed limits should be installed at the development access road.

Edwin L. Williams, president of the Limestone-Whetstone Homeowners Assn., who lives at 4481

Whetstone Rd. pointed out that it is already difficult to enter Rt. 92 from Whetstone Rd. and the addition of some 500 cars from the Verbeck development will create "a dangerous situation, especially at rush hour."

Mr. Dietrich responded by pointing out that traffic statistics say that Rt. 92 can handle the number of cars that will travel this route when traffic from the development is added but suggested that the homeowners in this area "keep pressure on New York State" to install adequate traffic controls.

Planning Board member John Greenfield suggested that the homeowners contact the New York State Dept of Transportation and discuss their problems and concerns with the traffic engineer and regional director in hopes of finding adequate traffic

Election Slates Set

Democrats, Republicans and Conservatives plan an active campaign for local offices, fielding candidates in Manlius, DeWitt and Pompey Tuesday was the deadline for nominating petitions, and Thursday is the final date for candidates who wish to decline.

Major question is whether there will be a separate independent candidate for the Manlius Town Board Election officials are still verifying the signatures on the nominating petition filed by Winthrop Collins of Manlius. Mr. Collins said he had 778 signers and needed 506 named to be officially nominated.

Whether or not his independent petition is accepted, Mr. Collins will have a spot on the ballot because he has been nominated by Manlius conservatives. He had earlier tried to force a Republican primary for the

Town Board nomination, but his petitions were ruled invalid.

At the top of the Manlius ballot, it will be a race between Keith Morgan, Republican and Jack Cottrell, Conservative for the supervisor post. Democrats failed to field a candidate.

For Town Board positions Democrats nominated Ronna Segal Isley, Barton K. Feinberg, and Laurence D. Martel. Conservative candidates will be Elizabeth Cady, Mr. Collins, and Neill DeWald.

Republican nominees are Campbell J. Tellman, Richard Cote and Lester McDermott, all incumbents.

For tax collector, the Democrats nominated Rosemary M. Mulligan to oppose incumbent M. Elowene McDermott who will be on the Republican and Conservative lines.

Police Justice Franklin Josef will appear on the Republican and Conservative lines with no Democrat candidate.

Town Clerk Gloria Miller and Highway Superintendent Charles Bender are unopposed with both Republican and Conservative backing, and no Democrat candidates.

Pompey

Harold A. Frediani, a Democrat who previously served as Pompey supervisor for four years, will run against incumbent Al Chartrand for supervisor. Mr. Chartrand succeeded Mr. Frediani.

Candidates for Town Clerk will be Catherine G. Phelan, Democrat and Conservative, and incumbent Carole Guynup, Republican. John Palladino, incumbent highway superintendent has Republican and Democrat endorsement.

In the at-large race for Town Board positions, Ronald L. Miller and Elton Brown are the Democrat nominees. Mr. Brown, who is the Pompey Conservative chairman, will

also appear on the Conservative line.

Republicans have nominated incumbents Carl Dennis and Helen M. Mills. Mrs. Mills, who was appointed recently to fill the vacancy created by the death of Geraldine Guynup will also appear on the Conservative line.

Incumbent Doris A. Holt will be the Republican candidate for tax collector, opposed by Marilyn Dean on the Democrat and Conservative lines.

For assessor four year term it will be a race between John Dady, Democrat, Harold J. Jenkins, Republican and Allan B. Decker, Conservative.

For the two year assessor term Robert H. Hyla, Democrat will be opposed by Austin W. Morley, Republican Conservative.

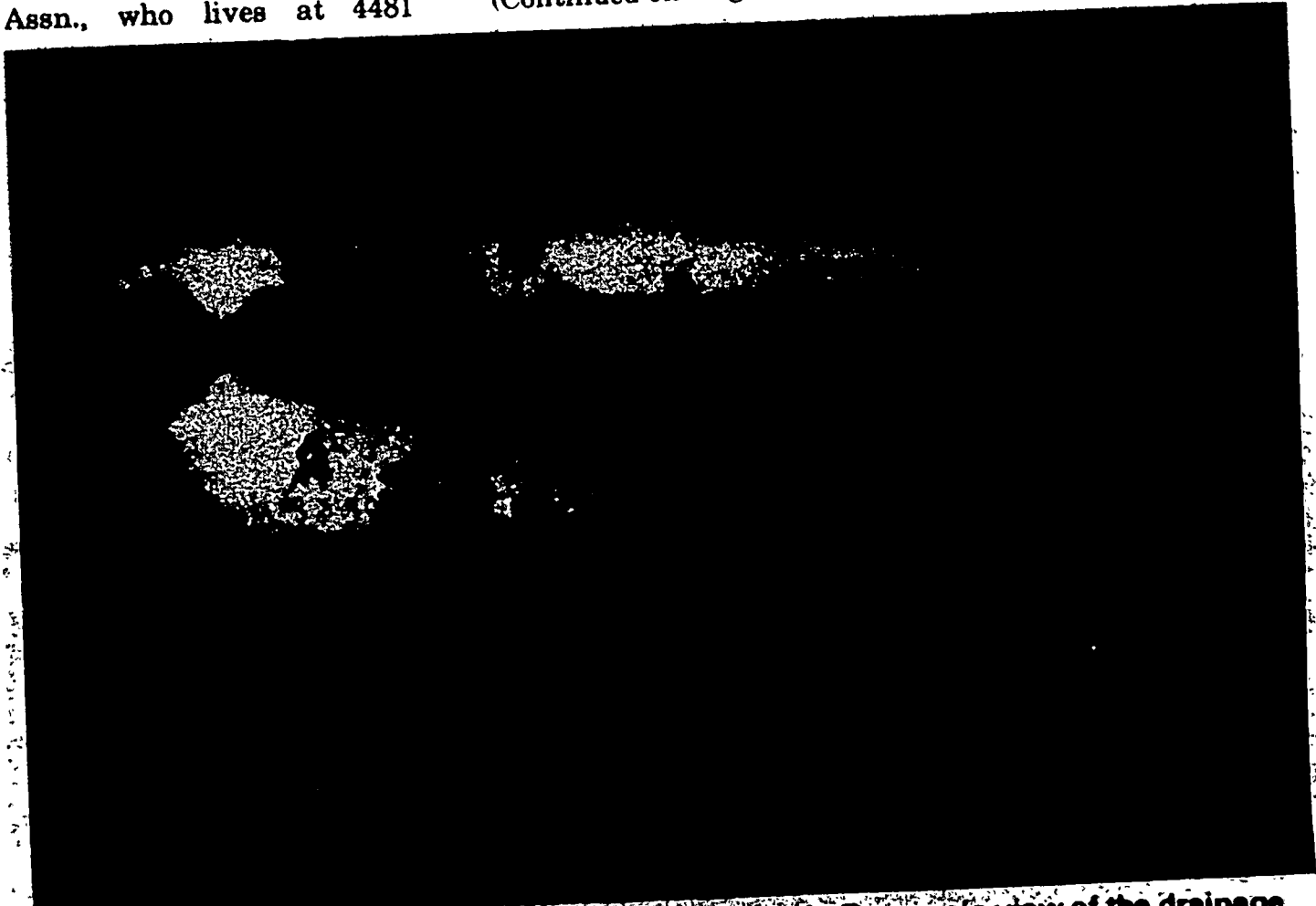
DeWitt

Democrat Roland Bouchard has been nominated by his party to oppose Burton W. Lowitz, Republican/Conservative for position as DeWitt supervisor. Mr. Bouchard has been the unsuccessful Democrat Candidate for the post several times, coming closest four years ago, when he lost to Royal Maxwell by only 344 votes.

Democrat candidates for Town Board are John T. McKenna, Paul Simonoff and Elena D'Arriga. Republicans running in the at-large race are Elayne O'Brien and Raymond Greabell, both incumbents, and S. Barry Sherlock, the Republican nominated for the position being vacated by Mr. Lowitz in his try for the town's top executive position.

DeWitt Conservatives have endorsed Mr. Greabell, Mr. Sherlock and Mr. McKenna.

Veteran town justice Edward N. Schepp, who has the Republican and Conservative nominations will be opposed by Peter A. Baum, Democrat candidate.
