

Army's Last Medal of Honor Man Still On Job as Sergeant --At \$150 a Month

He was ordered, he returned with the last unit, assisting a wounded comrade. Only 90 Congressional Medals of Honor were awarded for valor during the World War. Twenty-eight awards were posthumous, so that out of approximately 60 living World War medal of honor men, Sergeant Seibert is the only one to be in the enlisted ranks of the army today.

POPULAR GROWN IN FLORIDA VALUABLE AS PULPWOOD

The tree grows on waste land and even when in contact with salt water matures so rapidly that it is claimed a crop of pulpwood may be cut every year.
