## Northern League Still Functions Farrand Says

Manager of Ogdensburg Team Denies It Has Disbanded—Remainder of Schedule May Be Shortened

Manager Farrand of the Ogdensburg Northern League team denied the rumor yesterday that the league was to disband. He said that a meeting of all managers of teams in the league was to be held in Malone last night and that it would undoubtedly be decided to shorten the schedule and go into the final play-offs after the game today. The reason for this is understood to be that a number of clubs in the league are made up almost entirely of college players who will have to return to their schools before the completion of the original schedule and play-offs. Several of the teams which imported costly college stars this season have lost heavily on the

venture and it is thought that next year the practice of importing players will be discontinued and that the teams will be made up of residents of the various towns in the league. This was the policy of the local team this season and a great deal of credit is due the players and management for the showing made in the league this season against the paid players of the rest of the circuit. Although the Ogdensburg team has no chance of getting into the championship series this year the schedule will be finished and several strong teams are to be brought here to meet the locals at Winter Park following the league competition. The team travels to Chateaugay today to meet the strong Ponies.

## Further Increase in Canal Traffic Noted

OTTAWA, Aug. 19.—Traffic on Canadian canals continues to show an increase to date for every month of the present year. July showed 2,336,342 tons of freight carried as compared with 2,273,578 in July, 1932. Passengers num-

bered 15,526 last month, as against 15,199 for July a year ago.

The Trent canal, of course, carried the largest number last month with 10,494, compared with 10,251 in July, 1932. The only canal which did not show an increase in passengers was St. Peter's, N. S., the number being 53, exactly the same as a year ago, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics stated.

Although in the Welland Ship Canal, shipments of barley increased by 25,776 tons, rye by 37,766 tons, wheat by 115,516 tons, and 11 other commodities by lesser amounts compared with last year's shipments, these were more than offset by increases of 159,893 tons of soft coal, 28,725 tons of iron ore, 20,795 tons of sugar, 54,128 tons of merchandise and small increases in other commodities. The total of 1,121,302 tons was an increase of 89,580 tons, and the total for the season to July 31 of 4,057,941 tons was an increase over last year's of 459,245 tons.

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—The Giants opened their series with the Cubs with an 8-4 victory at the Polo Grounds this afternoon. Hubbell started in the pitching box for the Terry team but was relieved by Herman Bell in the eighth. Mel Ott hit two homers for the Giants and Cuyler got one for Chicago. The Braves continued their assault on the first division clubs today by trimming the Pittsburgh Pirates 5-2. The Braves, by their victory, gained the first division by a margin of one point over the Cards. The clouting Phillies won two games from the tail-end Reds 12-2 and 3-0.
