Milk Shed Code Plan to Be Considered in N. Y.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Further plans for bringing the New York milk shed under a code based on the Agricultural Adjustment Act will be discussed at a meeting to be held tomorrow at the State Office Building, 80 Centre Street, it was announced yesterday.

Dr. Clyde King, representing the Federal Government, will confer in executive session with representatives of the milk control boards of New York, New Jersey and Connecticut, said Burt W. Miller, assistant director of the New York Control Board. A first meeting of the same group, at which the general principles to guide in the formation of a trade agreement were worked out was held on Friday.

Mr. Miller also made public a letter, written to the State board

by Dr. Rollin A. Newton of Mesena, N. Y., commending the board's administration. Dr. Newton, who operates a 1,100-acre dairy farm said that his receipts for June of this year were almost double those of June, 1932.

The letter follows: "As an owner and operator of 1,100 acres of dairy farmlands I wish to express my appreciation of your work in the interest of the milk producers. Our checks for June milk this year for the same quantity and same test were a almost double June, 1932. The increased income and encouraged outlook for the dairy industry has prompted me to employ several carpenters and painters in making necessary improvements that we were unable to make under conditions existing during the past two years."

News of Gold Exports Causes Stocks to Rise
