

Jas. Carroll Succumbed At His Home Yesterday

James Carroll, 75, died at 7:50 a. m. yesterday at his home, 712 Lafayette street, after an illness of six weeks of heart trouble. He was born in Kemptonville, Canada, Aug. 10, 1858, son of John and Ellen McCafferty Carroll, and came to Ogdensburg fifty years ago. He was employed by the late John Hannan for many years. Surviving are his widow, Mary Eagan Carroll, whom he married 47 years ago; a son, Timothy Carroll of

Syracuse; a daughter, Mrs. Helen Carroll Sheldon, and two sisters, Misses Catherine and Anna Carroll of Ogdensburg. He was a member of St. Mary's parish, the Holy Name and Sacred Heart societies. Mr. Carroll was a well known and highly esteemed citizen with a large circle of friends who will deeply regret his death. The funeral will be held from the house tomorrow at 8:30 a. m. and at 9 at St. Mary's cathedral. Burial will be in St. Mary's cemetery.

There were 1,200 delegates to the National 4-H Club Congress from 46 States and the province of Ontario. Miss Commins and Moulton were state delegates as winners in the State Leadership Contest. Nichols and Laidlaw were county delegates from Jefferson and St. Lawrence Counties.

\$11,000 Is Paid To the C. W. A. Men

The second pay-off of C. W. A. workers was held at the city hall auditorium yesterday afternoon at 5 o'clock, when about \$11,000 was distributed among about 525 men.

The distribution was in charge of City Treasurer M. M. Morse and C. W. A. Director Arthur Fleetham. Mayor Morissette had expected to be present and give an address but early in the afternoon decided to accompany the Mayor's Relief Girls basket ball team to Tupper Lake, where it played the Oval Dish company's quintet last night.

Although the pay-off had been announced to take place at 5 p. m. there was considerable doubt earlier in the day whether authority would be received from New York. The checks were made out but were held until word came about 3 p. m. that the funds had been deposited.

New Police Head in New York War Leader of Co. D.

Gen. John O'Ryan Commanded the 27th Division, in Which Ogdensburg Men Served.

Major Gen. John F. O'Ryan, who will be the next police commissioner of New York city, was the war time commander of the 27th division, in which members of Company D of Ogdensburg served. On the occasion of the annual re-union of the Company D Veterans' association last September, Gen. O'Ryan sent a telegram of greeting. He had been invited to attend but found this impossible. In his message, which was received by Chief of Police Herbert S. Myers, a veteran of Company D, Gen. O'Ryan paid a tribute to the 107th Regiment, of which Company D was a part, and urged the veterans to continue to keep alive

war-time memories and comradeships.

Gen. O'Ryan was a candidate for the mayoralty nomination on the Fusion ticket last fall in New York but was forced out by Judge Seabury, who refused to back him. O'Ryan withdrew and gave wholehearted support to LaGuardia.

The position of police commissioner is generally conceded to be the most difficult one in New York. The force consists of 19,000 men. Fire Chief John J. McElligott, whom Mayor-elect LaGuardia will elevate to the position of fire commissioner, is said to be a distant relative of the McElligott family of Ogdensburg. He was born in Vermontville, Franklin county.

Chief of Police Herbert S. Myers sent a telegram of congratulation to Gen. O'Ryan.

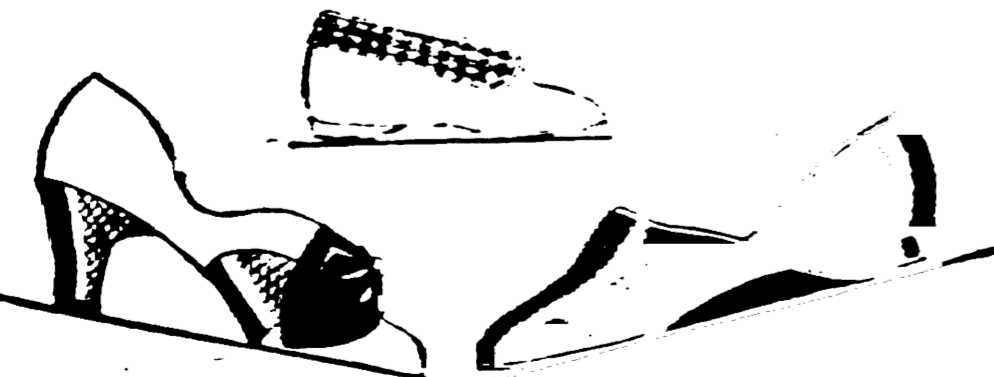
