ANNUAL REPORT OF THE TREAS-URER OF THE VILLAGE.

Sources of Village Funds and How the Money Has Been Spent,-Half of the Disbursements Went for Labor

For the benefit of those who may not care to make a study of the report of the treasurer of the village of Lowville, printed below, we note the total receipts for the year were \$15, 430.14, of which the highway fund was charged with \$7,389.15 and the contingent fund with \$8,040.99. The largest items of expense were for labor, \$5,614.20, for street lights, \$2,539.-Mr. and Mrs. Nicholas Stoffle were 96, for road building material, \$1,406. 60, for extending water mains and installing hydrants, \$992.62, for new
