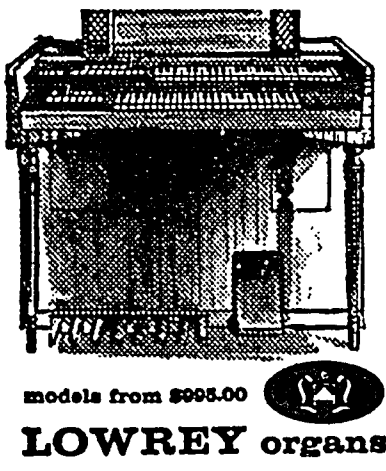

stein of Kathleen Lane, Mount Kisco, collided at the same hour on Lexington Ave. near the Columbus Ave. intersection. Both were southbound when the Hohenstein car skidded and hit the rear of the other vehicle. Bedford police reported two mishaps within five minutes time Saturday morning. At 11:25 A.M. Archibald Wirtz, sixty six, of Guard Hill Rd., Bedford, escaped unhurt when his car skidded while eastbound on Route 172, left the road and hit a culvert. At 12:30 a car driven by Marianne Potter of Katonah skidded and flipped over on its side at the junction of Route 22 and Beaver Dam Rd., Katonah.

Bedford police said Norma Bouchard, twenty nine, of Yorktown, was involved in an accident at 11:50 A.M. Saturday when the hard top sedan she was driving south on Stamford Rd., Bedford, skidded into a rock ledge.

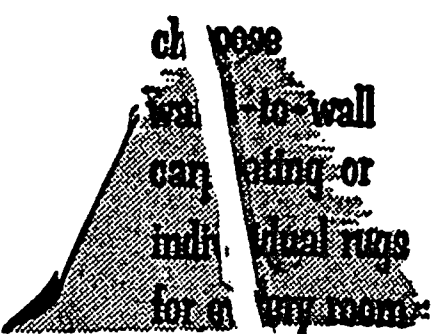

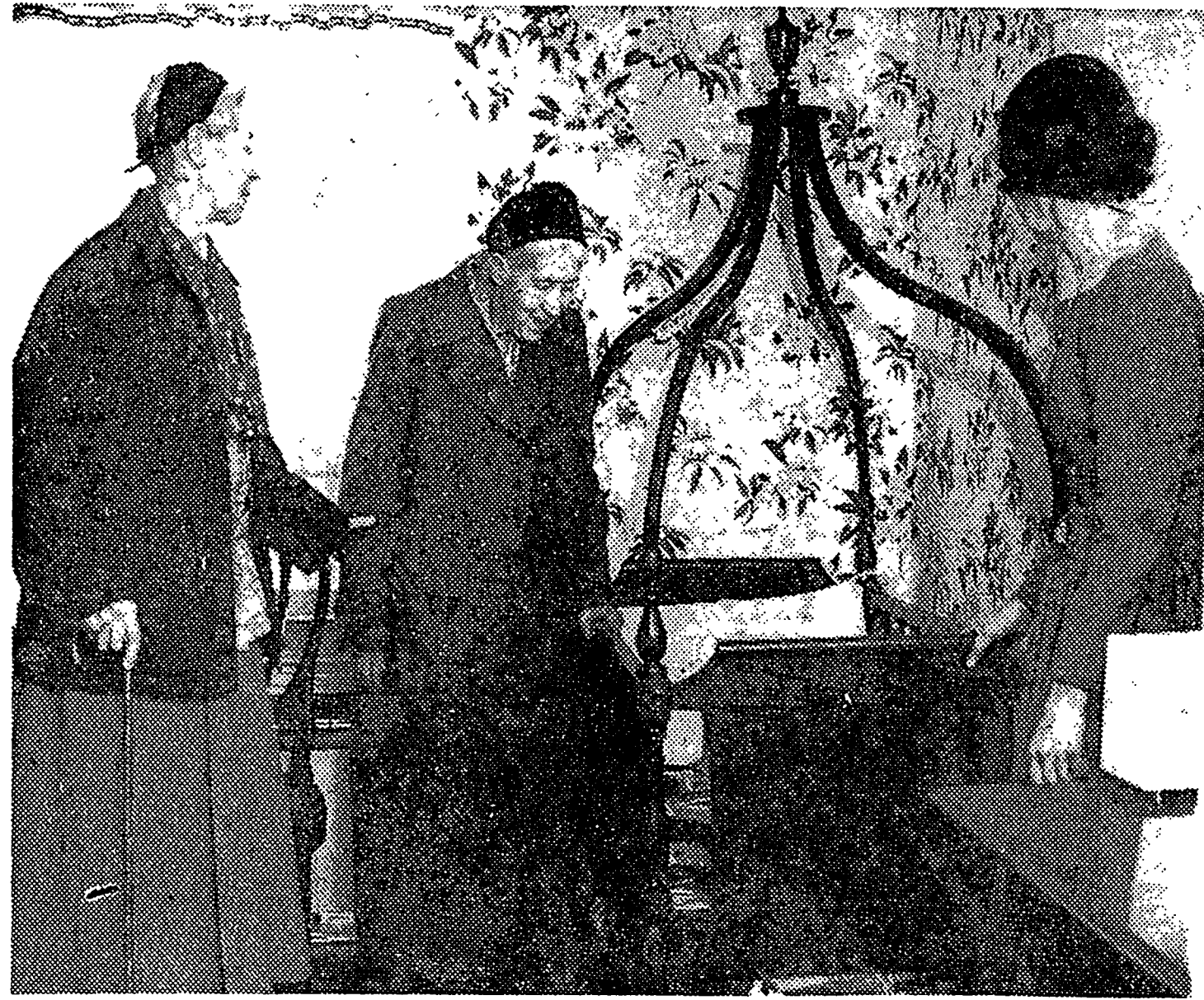

Citizens Advisory Group Draws 60 to 1st Meeting

"One of the finest responses from a group of volunteers that I have ever seen" is the way John R. Tulloch, chairman of the Mount Kisco Planning Board described the Dec. 4 meeting in the Municipal Building, which attracted more than 60 interested residents who are now members of the citizen's advisory committee on the Comprehensive Development Plan for the Village of Mount Kisco.

This extensive study, undertaken by Raymond and May Associates, of present village conditions and their recommendations for planning for the years of expansion immediately ahead, will be reviewed and studied by several groups under a chairman, recruited from among the volunteers who were present. Each chairman will be expected to submit a report of findings and comment, representative of the thinking of his unit, at a later date.

The traffic and highway committee met Monday evening with Daniel O'Leary as chairman; the zoning committee with Frank Broz as chairman, is meeting tonight; the business district committee with J. Edward Fox as chairman has set Dec. 29 for the first meeting and John Herbert, chairman of the recreation plan committee will meet with his committee on Jan. 2.

George M. Raymond and David Orstein of Raymond and May Associates, answered questions from the floor, and discussed the background and objectives of their firm's proposals.

Raymond and May have submitted both a Comprehensive Development Plan and a proposed zoning ordinance. The zoning ordinance, if adopted, would have the force of law, but the development plan, even if accepted by the Planning Board, is an advisory document only, intended as a guide for the village board.

The Comprehensive Development plan was submitted in a 183-page book, which includes a detailed planning and survey analysis, the plan itself, and a section on means of putting the plan into effect. The proposed Zoning Ordinance is a separate document of some 60 pages, including a zoning map, district regulations, and sections on

enforcement and appeal. 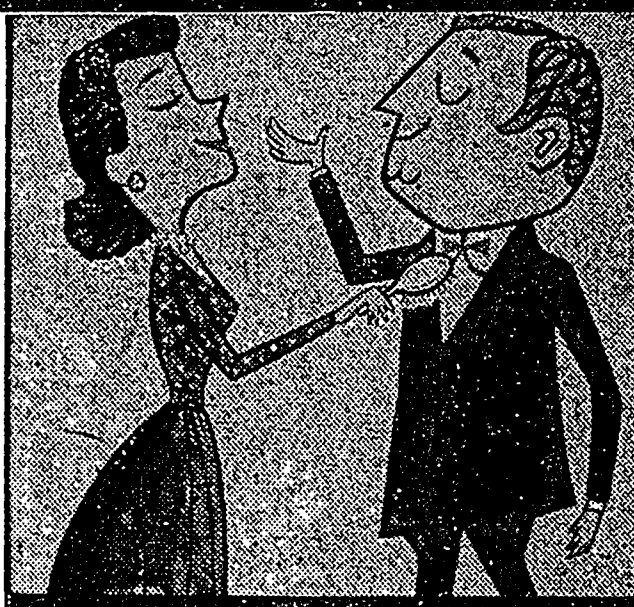

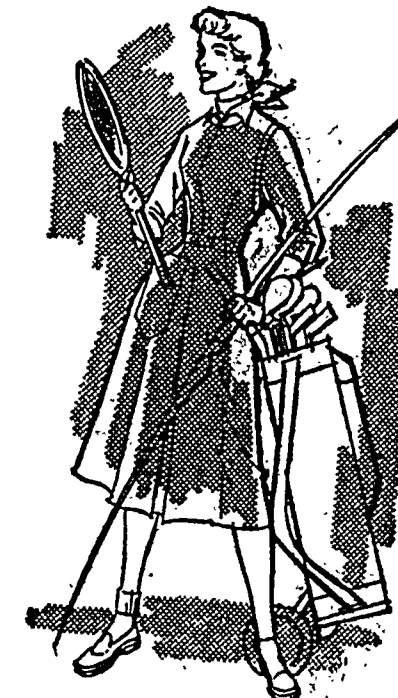
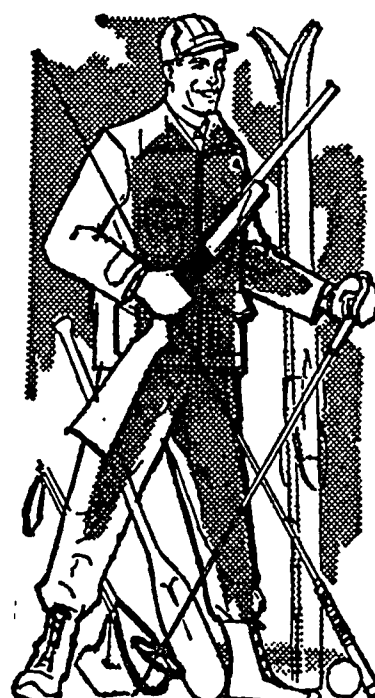
