CHAPPAQUA—Santa has plenty of helpers this year at the Children's Aid Society Elisabeth Milbank Anderson Convalescent Home.

With the exception of the toddlers, all 87 girls at the home spend about two hours a day in the "Santa Claus Workshop."

Even some of the toddlers have been taking part. If they do not have creative ability, they at least have enthusiasm.

The girls started warming up for the Christmas workshop with a Thanksgiving workshop. They

made Thanksgiving decorations for the home and for their own homes. By the time the Thanksgiving holiday was over, the girls were really ready to roll.

The program, planned to provide creative occupations for the girls, has exceeded all expectations, officials said. Already the workshop is filled with decorations of silver stars, blue and red candles covered with sequins, angles with star-studded wings and multi-colored paper chains.

But the girls really have surprised the directors at the home with their skill in creating gifts. Old buttons have been made into beautiful earrings, donated cloth has been used to make slippers, dolls, caps, aprons, pillow cases, and in one case a giant frog.

The results of the girls' creative ability will provide gifts for their families and friends.

Michael Lenzi, director of the home, said two volunteers helped in the workshop, but the girls did practically all of their own work. If he adults were depended on, it was usually for ideas, he said.

Besides providing the home with Christmas decorations and many people with gifts, the girls are taking a big load off Santa's shoulders, he added.
