Cerebral Palsy Assn. Funds Go to Educational Services

A gift of more than \$2,000 which has been given to the Board of Cooperative Educational Services by the Westchester Cerebral Palsy Assn., Inc., will come before the board of BOCES for acceptance Jan. 21.

The Westchester Cerebral Palsy Assn., which ceased to function January 1957, is surrendering its charter. The board of directors voted to turn over residual funds to BOCES for support of its classes for cerebral palsied children at the Ferris Avenue School.

Dr. Bernard L. Bryan, BOCES director, said that if the money was accepted it would probably be used to purchase school equipment. The Westchester Cerebral Palsy Assn. was organized in 1946 by a group of parents in the county to aid in the campaign for state legislation for the care, treatment and rehabilitation of the cerebral palsied. The first clinic in the county was opened in Bedford in January, 1947.

Two years later a national organization was launched by another group in the southern part of the county, and called the United Cerebral Palsy Assn. Inc. According to the Westchester association it became increasingly difficult to compete with nationally sponsored fund-raising campaigns. With a view toward unifying efforts, the Westchester association agreed to join the United association in establishing a center for cerebral palsied in White Plains. According to the association, in 1956 it voted to advance \$15,000 to the United Cerebral Palsy Assn. of Westchester County of property in White Plains to be developed into a center for clinic and school facilities. The property was acquired, but never used as intended because of zoning restrictions.

The Westchester Cerebral Palsy Assn. has voted to turn over to the United association its share of funds to be realized from the sale of the White Plains property. It stipulated the money was to be used to provide summer camp scholarships for cerebral palsied children attending the Ferris Avenue School. BOCES, under the State Education Department, has been conducting classes for CP students since last September.
