Objection was raised to the placing of Ruppert's property and property of the radio station in an M-1 district. Although it was realized that this area may be swampy and is adjacent to the sewer disposal area and the incinerator, it is also in very close proximity to Williamstown and other residential areas. It was felt that the disposal works will soon be closed and this property could very well be developed either for residential purposes or for limited office purposes. It was the opinion of that part of the committee considering this part of the problem, that this should be set up as a 0-1 district with the right to build residences therein.

Objection was raised to the new residence B district, in that it permitted three family residences. Most of the area which is proposed for a B district is currently restricted to two family dwellings. To increase this to three would be down zoning and it was not considered that this should be done. Three of the major areas for this zone of Moore Avenue, the area around Hyatt Avenue and part of the property of the Swiss Home. As to the latter, this would permit three family dwellings immediately adjacent to our highest zoning—AAA. It was realized that the area at Hyatt Avenue and Terrace Place which is now zoned for multiple residence was proposed for the new residence B, and it might be that a different district B-1 be created which would permit three family residences and that area be placed in this B-1 setup, as might the area in the vicinity of Maple Avenue.

The committee found no other general problem in relation to the division of the village into areas.

**Further Study**  
A further study of the proposed zoning law in connection with the technical changes will be made and a further report submitted.

Attention should be called to the fact that under the proposed law the manufacturing districts will not be limited to the extent that our present industrial district is. For example, one of the forbidden uses in our present manufacturing district is the manufacture of paint. Although the new law prohibits any use which presents a hazard to the public, it is questionable whether that would limit a paint manufacturing enterprise.

It was and is the opinion of the members of the committee that a zoning law can only be as good as its enforcement and that no matter how well a new zoning law might be thought out, it will not be of any value if it is not enforced. Many comments were made by various members of the committee as to present violations, some of which have existed many years and others of which are of recent origin.

The new look, getting away from the drab prison gray, is expected to take two years to finish.

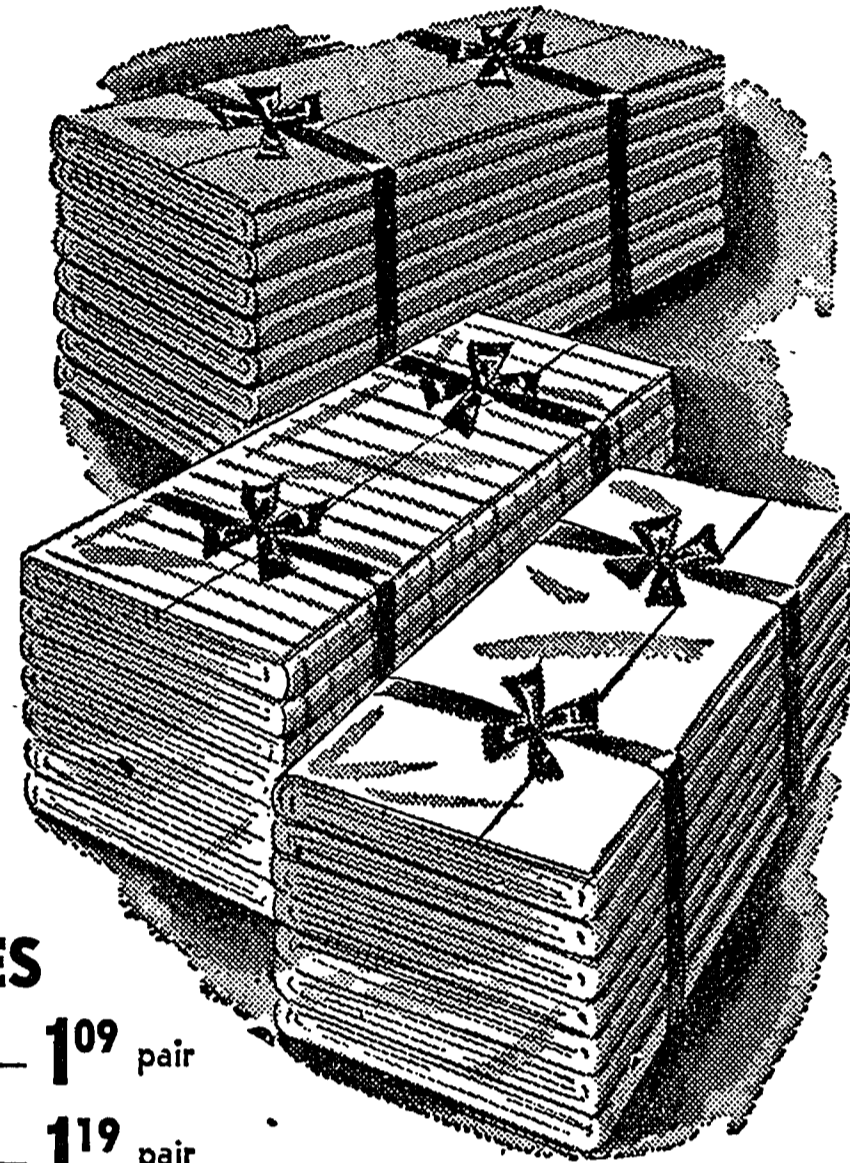
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
