Mr. Howe served with the United States Army from 1942 to 1946 and left the service with the rank of captain. He is a member of the New York State Society of Cincinnati.

Interested in all phases of volunteer work, Mrs. Goodhue was chairman of the Cancer Drive in Mount Kisco in 1957, has assisted in fund-raising for the Red Cross, the Adoption Service of Westchester, Northern Westchester Hospital, The United Cerebral Palsy Association, the Legal Aid Society and others.
