**Big Strike on in Great Britain**  
 London, Jan. 28--It is estimated that nearly two hundred thousand men and women are idle in the United Kingdom of Ireland because of the strikes in the various trades, creating one of the most serious situations industrially that the country has had to face in many years.

Approximately half of the strikers are in the Belfast district where the strike movement is coming to spread.

There is no change in the Clyde section where twenty thousand ship workers are out, nor in London where fifteen thousand ship repairers have gone on strike and have refused an offer to refer the wage question to a committee.

Other strikes include that of 24,000 Fife miners, six thousand South Wales miners, five thousand Edinburgh shipwrights, four thousand Manchester dockers, four thousand South Wales shipyard men and a number of Glasgow municipal workers.

**Wilson Gives Them "Near Beer"**  
 Reports from the food administration at Washington Tuesday announced that President Wilson had signed a proclamation in Paris on January 23rd, removing all restrictions from the manufacture and sale of the drink known as "near beer"--a drink so near like beer that a drunk who is loaded with near beer can't be distinguished from a drunk who is loaded with the real old stuff.

Wonder what the friends of the president among the W. C. T. U. will think of this latest fantastic move on his part.

Near beer should not be allowed if the real article is to be stopped, for the difference between the two is so very trifling that they remind one of the trifling difference between the huns and the Bolsheviks.
