Black Raiders Trim Fredonia Hillbillies 6-0, Here Last Sat.

Result Of Gowanda-Falconer Game This Saturday All Important To Raiders

Last Saturday afternoon the Fredonia Hillbillies put up a valiant goal line stand in the first two periods before bowing to the Black Raiders 6 to 0 after a 65-yard march down the field in the third period.

Playing on a slippery field and in a high wind, the Hillbillies from Fredonia were at a great disadvantage due to the weight of the Creeker's A wet and slippery ball kept the kicking of both teams to a low average. Rod Griewisch averaged about 37 yards per boot, while Cave's booting sank to about 20 yards per kick.
