Little Cats hope to end losing streak

Wildcats edge Raiders; face rough road ahead

 The Gouverneur Wildcats got back into full stride last Tuesday evening, ending a two game losing streak and defeating arch rival Massena, 70-44. Both squads came out with a tough man-to-man defense with the Wildcats putting slight pressure on the Red Raiders in the backcourt. Massena switched to a 3-2 defense that kept the Wildcat shooting to the outside. It looked as though it might be another cold spell for the Cats as they were unable to hit from the field, a similar occurrence that happened against Malone. It would prove to be an interesting evening with the match-up of 6'4" centers Randy Burnham of Massena and Gouverneur's Bob Siver. Siver never really got a chance to prove himself as he had collected three personal fouls at 3:29 of the first quarter. Burnham took advantage of Siver's foul trouble to pluck the Wildcat defense and lead the Raiders to an 18-14 first quarter lead.

The Wildcats outscored their opponents in the second quarter 26-15 to take a slim 34-33 halftime lead to the locker room. Bill Cook, replacing Siver, played a fine defensive game, grabbing rebound after rebound and blocking many Raider shots. Even though the Cats played a respectable offensive quarter, they committed numerous and foolish fouls that resulted in the Raiders drawing within one at the half. John Lallier had collected four fouls at 1:26 of the second quarter to put a damper on his effectiveness for the rest of the evening.

The third quarter was a wild and woolly one indeed in which two technical fouls were called. It also saw a slip on the part of the officials. Steve Hall connected from the field and proceeded to take the ball out from the end line. Would you believe he succeeded before Coach Charlie Boats ignited from the bench to bring the miscue to the attention of the officials. There was also a keen test of two quarterbacks in the second half — Massena's Jim Callahan and the Wildcats Mark Leonard. Leonard poured in 14 of his 18 points in the second half to enable the Cats to narrowly defeat the Red Raiders. In the fourth quarter, the Wildcats again became erratic, committing often costly mistakes and leaving the Raiders open under the boards. Bob Siver fouled out at 3:19 and Massena's big man, Burnham, left the scene at 2:52, but not before he had connected for 16 points. The Wildcats left much to be desired on the defensive boards. The Raiders had as many as four tries sometimes to score compared to only one for the Cats, which could have proved costly to the Wildcats. If the Cats hope to keep on winning they will have to toughen on the defensive boards and get the rebounding offensively to rack up the points.

Leading the Wildcat offense were Mark Leonard (18), Greg Langevin (16), Barry Wells (16), and John Lallier (11). The Raiders' co-captain, Jim Callahan, led his team in scoring with 18 points followed by Randy Burnham with 16. Last night the Wildcats were to face the always tough Canton Golden Bears. The Bears bring in a 3-1 record and an offense that averages 69 points per outing. They are ranked fourth in the league in defense allowing their opponents only 57 points. The Wildcats will take to the road Friday, Jan. 21, to face the Salmon River Shamrocks in

 The Wildcats went into an effective press the first quarter that created confusion for the Raiders. Gouverneur missed many shots and easy opportunities to score. After an 8-11 first quarter, the Massena Red Raiders pulled ahead in the second quarter on some fine drives through the key by Doug Wood. Massena scored 18 points in the second quarter compared to only 7 for the Cats. After trailing 26-15 at the half, the Wildcats came on strong in the third quarter to outscore their opponents, 17-13. They were relieved when Gouverneur's big man, Reilly, fouled out at 3:14 and from then on the Raiders were no longer pressed as they won comfortably, 58-42.

 It definitely had to be the best basketball game played so far in the Rural League as First National put on a strong second half to narrowly defeat Carbone's, 47-44. Rescue Squad reports on year's activities
 The Gouverneur Rescue Squad had one of its busiest years of its six years service to the community.
 In 1971 the squad answered 584 calls which broken into categories are as follows: Gouveneur, 377; Fowler, 87; DeKalb, 49; Rossie, 47; Macomb, 16; Hermon, 9; Hammond, 1; Edwards, 11; and Russell, 1.
 One hundred forty-four transfers for the year included ones as far away as Albany and Buffalo. A large number of these were to Watertown and Syracuse. Car and motorcycle accidents totaled 67 and there were six snowmobile accidents. The squad went on 21 calls where for various reasons no action was taken. There were approximately 16 calls to the mines, mills and factories in the area.
 The squad consists of 38 members who donated 8,760 hours of their time per year to insure the residents of this community a 24-hour ambulance service. It serves one of the largest areas in New York State and is a volunteer organization.

Members take standard and advanced first aid courses and most have completed a night school course given at Canton or Watertown to become certified by the State as MEDICAL EMERGENCY TECHNICIANS.
 In the past year two more stalls were added to the garage. The parking lot was filled and graded and some remodeling on the rest of the building was done.
