Rensselaer Falls man hospitalized with burns

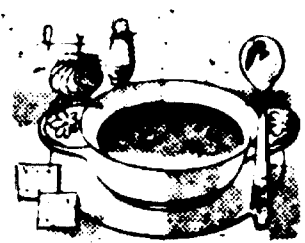

County employment sets December high

State Industrial Commissioner Louis L. Levine has stated that employment in St. Lawrence County for December 1971 was 39,700, setting a new high for that month. The employment total for November 1971 was 40,500 and in December 1970 employment totaled 39,400.

Commissioner Levine said winter layoffs in construction and farming caused the job total to dip by 800 to 39,700, but the total was 300 more than the total for December 1970. Unemployment in St. Lawrence County in December was 3,700, as compared to the November 1971 total of 3,300 and 2,900 for December 1970. The unemployment rate was 8.6 per cent in December 1971 and for November 1971 the rate was 7.5 per cent. The unemployment rate for December 1970 was 6.9 per cent.
