

# Gouverneur wins Sectionals

The Gouverneur Wildcat Varsity Wrestlers captured 127 points Saturday, Feb. 26 to win the 1972 Section 10 Wrestling Tournament. Four Gouverneur boys took first place in their respective weight classes, and all 12 boys on the Wildcat squad placed either first, second, third or fourth out of the 12 teams.

The wrestling at these sectionals was of the finest caliber, as over 100 matches were held. Gouverneur was followed by Canton with 68 1/2 points, and Potsdam and Massena with 58 1/2 and 58 points respectively.

Section 10 champions for Gouverneur were George Serviss at 108, Randy Evans at 135, Ron Sherman at 148, and Bob Byrns at 158.

(Ron Sherman was Section 10 champion last year also). These boys, along with the other eight first placers, will participate in the State Sectionals at Syracuse on March 10 and 11.

Coach Lacey Jones was very happy with the results of these Sectionals and he was especially pleased with the fact that all 12 Gouverneur wrestlers placed. He said that this is probably the first time that this has ever happened in Section 10 wrestling.

At 170 Tom Gates advanced to the finals but lost to Ives of OFA in an extremely close match. Both grapplers wrestled well, but Ives won the match by an 8 to 7 decision. Nate Shippee also took second place after losing in the finals to Fiocco from Massena by a 5 to 1 decision. In the heavyweight finals Gouverneur's Brian Sharpe received second place after losing to Tyndall from Madrid-Waddington. Their final match was full of excitement as Tyndall only won by a 2 to 1 decision.

Of the 12 champions Gouverneur produced four. Potsdam had

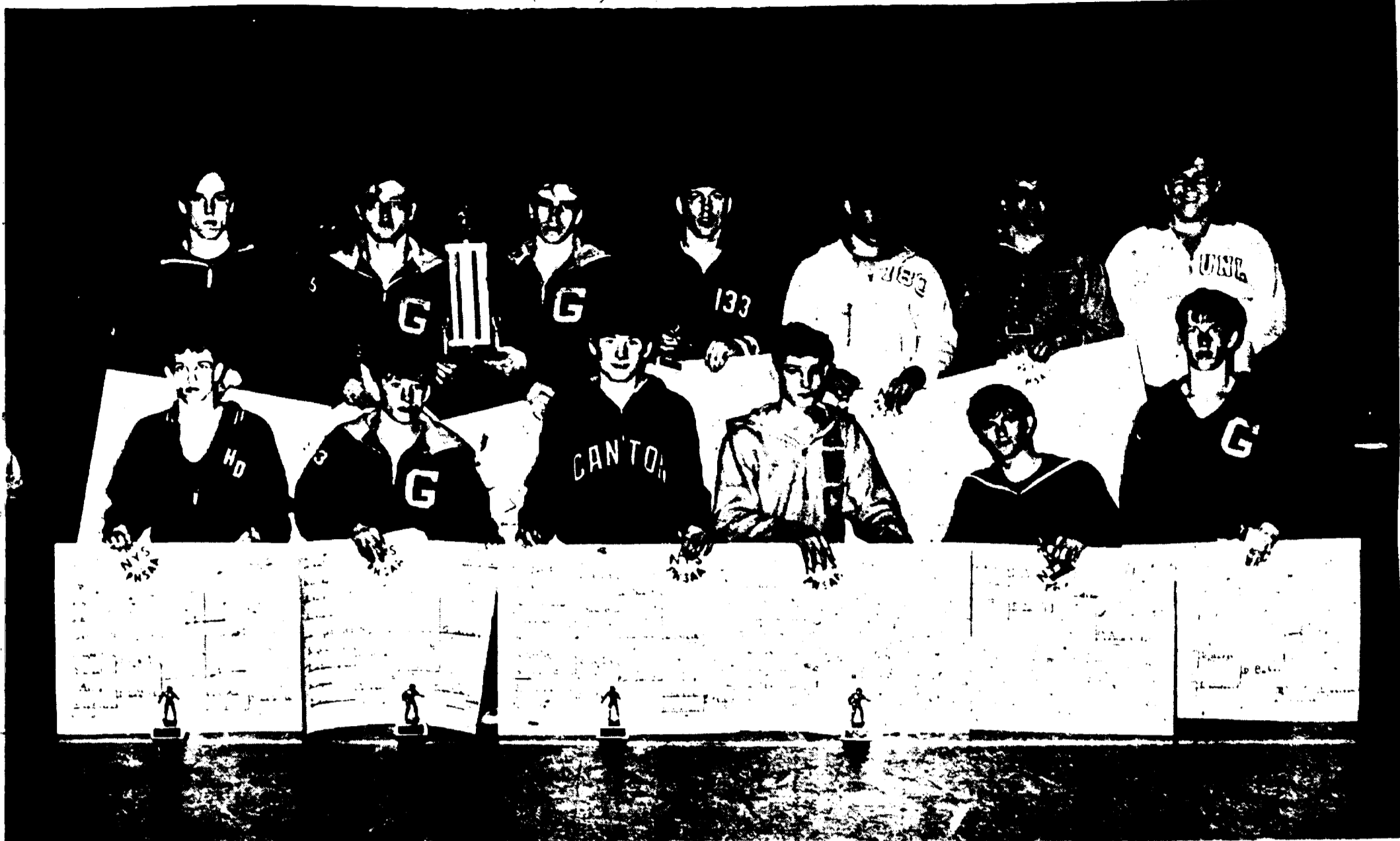
two, Madrid-Waddington had two and the other four came from Hermon-DeKalb, Canton, OFA and Massena with one each.
