Register to vote

All St. Lawrence County voters are urged to register to vote in the general election day, November 7.

Representatives from the County Board will be at Massena Town Hall, Aug. 16 from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Aug. 17 from 1 p.m. to 8 p.m.; at Potsdam Civic Center Auditorium on Aug. 21—9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Aug. 22—1 p.m. to 8 p.m.; at Ogdensburg City Hall on Aug. 24—from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and Aug. 25 from 1 p.m. to 8 p.m.

In the official polling place in Ogdensburg registration days are Oct. 6—12 noon to 7 p.m., Oct. 7—10 a.m. to 8 p.m. and Oct. 10—12 noon to 7 p.m.

This is an opportunity to register for those who are 18 years of age now or will be 18 by Nov. 7; those who will be away at school in October when County registration days are held; those who may have moved or may not be registered in the County regardless of which community they may now live in.

## Athletic exams held next week

Athletic physical examinations will be given for Gouverneur Central School Football, Cross Country and Soccer squads according to the following schedule:

Monday, August 21—9 a.m.—11 a.m. —Varsity and Junior Varsity Football; Tuesday, August 22—9 a.m.—11 a.m. — Soccer; Tuesday, August 22—1 p.m.—2 p.m. — Cross Country.

A boy shall be eligible for interscholastic competition only between his 14th and 19th birthdays. He must be 14 years old and in the ninth grade. A pupil who attains the age of 19 or after September 1 may continue to participate during that school year in all sports.

All football, cross country and soccer candidates must be examined and receive equipment before eligible to participate. Candidates will report to the equipment room following physical examinations.

Football practice will begin Aug. 23.

## Msgr. McCarthy to speak on Governor's Day at Fair

Rev. Msgr. Robert J. McCarthy has been invited to speak at a dinner to be held at Hotel Syracuse in honor of Mrs. Nelson Rockefeller on Governors Day at the New York State Fair, Aug. 30.

Msgr. McCarthy, known as chaplain of the carnivals and carnival workers or outdoor showmen, annually speaks at over 100 banquets—conventions of State Firemen, State Police, CSEA, Business and Professional Women, Greyhound Drivers' Association, church groups and all types of service clubs.

He has been asked to describe his experiences with the carnival business. As their chaplain he has baptized babies, married couples, buried the dead. He

annually addresses showmen at their meetings and banquets. For years he has been a speaker at the National Showmen's dinner at the Commodore Hotel in New York. He has addressed the showmen in Boston, Tampa, Miami Beach and Las Vegas. He has received numerous awards from showmen for his contribution to their work. Because of his experience he has appeared on TV in both the United States and Canada.

Msgr. McCarthy is chaplain for the International Association of Showmen, National Showmen's Association, Miami Showmen's Association, Greater Tampa Showmen's Association, International Showmen's Association and Showmen's Association for Better Industry.

Robert Rice, Richville, who had reached a total of nine

gallons of blood donated, at the May clinic, was on hand to start on his tenth gallon.
