Planned Parenthood increases services

Mrs. Susan Bryant has been hired by Planned Parenthood of St. Lawrence County as Assistant Program Director in charge of information and education. Mrs. Bryant, whose husband is a Residence Counselor at the State Agricultural and Technical College in Canton, began work in October.

Mrs. Bryant received her Bachelor of Arts degree in secondary education from the State University College at Oswego in 1970, and her Master of Science degree in personnel and counseling from the State University at Albany in 1972. Her work experience includes one year as a Residence Hall Director at the State University College at Oneonta and one year as a counselor for Canton ATC's Economic Opportunity Program. While Planned Parenthood

began as a family planning service, it has lately been serving the community in other ways as well. Mrs. Bryant's function is to develop sex education programs for groups throughout St. Lawrence County. This is being done through church and community groups, on a number of subjects related to sex education. Programs are available for all age groups and interests. In addition to Mrs. Bryant's availability as a resource person, Planned Parenthood also has pamphlets and films available on such subjects as venereal disease, teenage pregnancy, sex education for teens, family planning and contraception.
