

Girl Scouting observes 61st birthday this week

Girls and adult members of the Thousand Islands Girl Scout Council, Inc., this week join almost four million members of the organization nationwide in observing the 61st birthday of Scouting.

During the week of March 11-17 more than 5500 Brownies, Juniors, Cadettes and Seniors of the tri-county council, along with leaders and other volunteers, are noting Girl Scout Week.

This year's theme of "A Week of Celebration" will be highlighted by introduction of a new Promise and Law, and of new uniforms for Brownies.

Scouts in Jefferson, Lewis and St. Lawrence counties began the week by attending church on Girl Scout Sabbath or Sunday. In several churches a service was followed by breakfast for the Scouts.

Ingatherings and other special meetings take place during the week as Scouts celebrate the birthday and thank organizations and communities for their support.

Scouting this year observes its birthday with a newly-worded Promise and Law. Words familiar to the more than 30 million women and men who have been involved in Scouting since it began March 12, 1912, are changed to more current words and phrases.

As they participate in Girl Scout week activities, troops will be repeating the new Promise: "On my honor, I will try: To serve God, My country and my fellow Scouts."

Older Scouts will note several differences in the new Law, which reads: "I will do my best: to be honest, to be fair, to help where I am needed, to be cheerful, to be friendly and considerate, to be a sister to every Girl Scout, to respect



authority, to use resources wisely, to protect and improve the world around me, to show respect for myself and others through my words and actions."

Brownies, the youngest members of the Scouting family, will be appearing in new uniforms for the first time during Girl Scout Week.

A traditional style which has not changed greatly since 1941 has been replaced by five separates that can be mixed and matched, with accessories.

A brown, A-line jumper can be worn separately or with combinations of shorts, slacks and a blouse or orange knit pullover.

One thing remains constant, and that's the brown beret which has long been a identifying mark for young Scouts. The uniforms are available at local Scout equipment stores. Brownies take another step this

week as they, too, learn the new Promise rather than a separate one which has traditionally been just for them.

The approximately 270 troops of the Thousand Islands Girl Scout Council join some 164,000 troops across the nation and in 49 countries where U.S. citizens are living, in observation of Girl Scout Week. During this time girls in the United Fund-supported organization take note of their position as members of the World Assn. of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts in 91 countries.

Girl Scouting began 61 years ago when Juliette Gordon Lowe brought to the United States the ideas and ideals of Guiding learned from Lord Robert Baden-Powell in England. The first troop, started in Savannah, Ga., in 1912, was the beginning of an organization which today claims 3,716,000 members.
