## Over 250 attend retirement dinner

Several prominent personalities and over 250 friends and relatives gathered at the Elks Club Saturday night to pay homage to retiring village administrator and engineer, Glenn Miller.

Seated at the head table with Glenn and Frances Miller were Congressman Robert C. McEwen, State Senator H. Douglas Barclay, and Mrs. Barclay, Assemblyman K. Daniel Haley, William H. Power, St. Lawrence County district attorney, and his daughter, Lorraine, Supreme Court Justice Edmund L. Shea and Mrs. Justice, Mayor and Mrs. Anthony Pastizzo, former village attorney Edward H. Case and Mrs. Case, Rev. and Mrs. Stanley E. Brown, and former Mayors Ashton E. Liscum Sr. and Robert D. Hayden and Mrs. Hayden.

Speakers in turn touched on the contributions made by Mr. Miller to the village during his years of public service.

Mayor Pastizzo said it is difficult to find words to pay homage to this fine gentleman, Glenn Miller, who has been involved with and concerned with the progress over 38 years of the village of Gouverneur.

Administrators among engineers — engineer among administrators — Congress McEwen described Mr. Miller. "I cannot live in Gouverneur or drive through Gouverneur

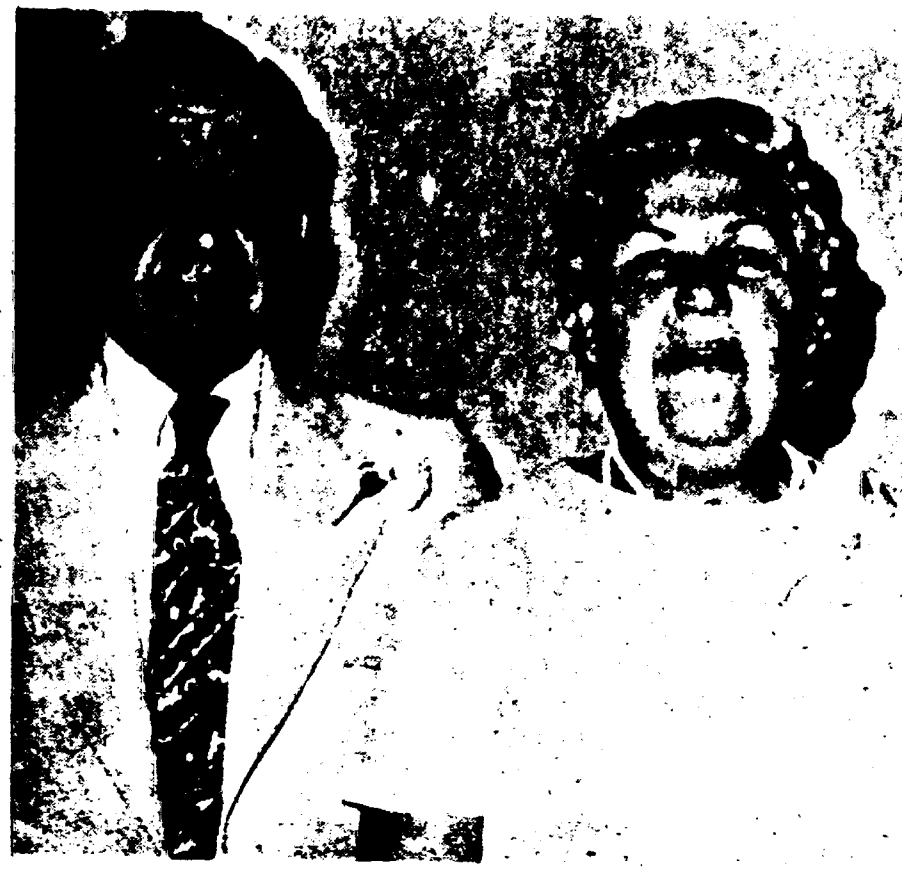
without feeling and seeing the results of that to which he has contributed so much." In particular, the congressman referred to the downtown parking area which has kept the shopping area intact and to the "finest water in the world."

"Dedicated people like Glenn Miller are what makes the north country grow," said Senator Barclay. "I am pleased — particularly with the housing project for senior citizens, in which I know Glenn played a very substantial part." "We all owe Glenn Miller a real debt of gratitude."

Assemblyman Dan Haley, recognizing Mr. Miller throughout the state as an expert on village government, said "when I had to take a cram course, it was Glenn to whom I turned, and I came tonight to say 'thank you, thank you very much'."

Former Mayor Liscum called the guest of honor "a man who truly loves Gouverneur." He traced Mr. Miller's work with the village and referred to the respect in which he is held by county and state officials. "He deserves special recognition for the many years of service — he will be a hard man to replace. We can never thank him enough," Mr. Liscum concluded.

Msgr. Robert J. McCarthy, Watertown, former pastor of St. James Church, sparkling as

Thomas M. Riddick of Riddick and Association, New York City, presented Glenn with a chain saw. The Riddick firm designed the village water filtration plant and the proposed sewage disposal plant.

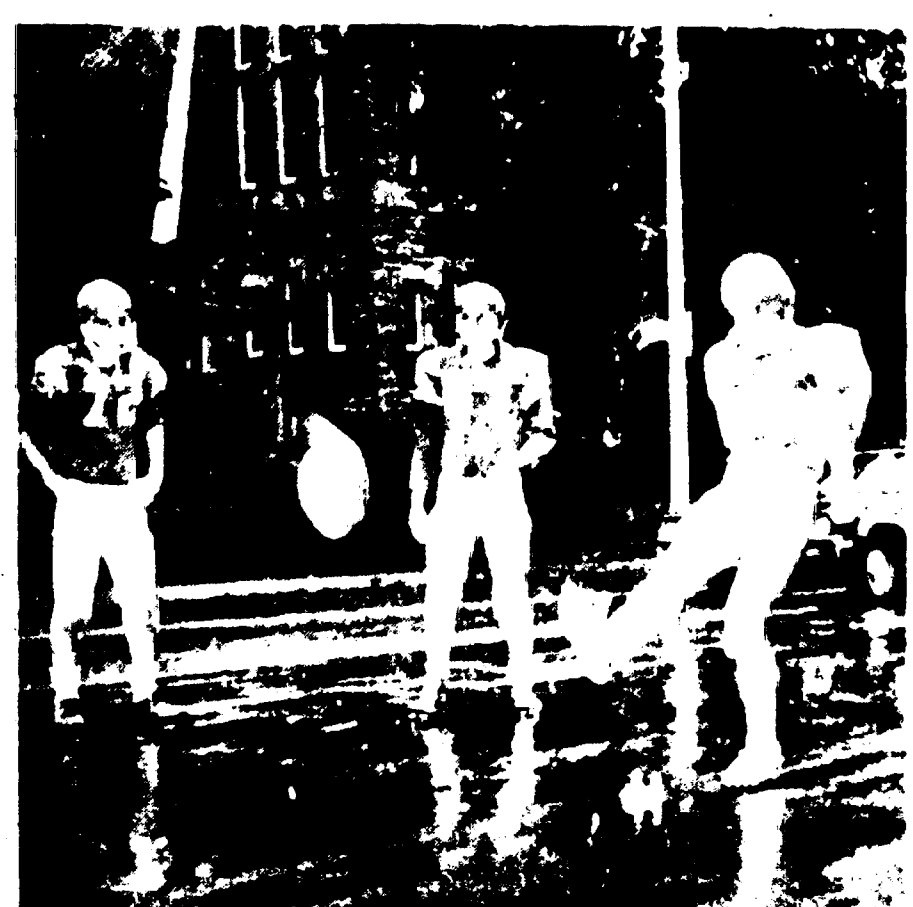
Grand Knight Ronald McReynolds, in presenting a citation from Bishop Navaugh
