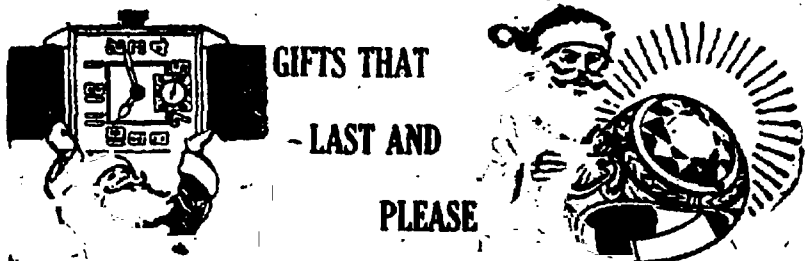

The severe storm of November 28-29 A Record Breaker for This Section—Only Nineteen Dairy Farmers Out of Sixty Dairy Farmers Able to Reach Milk Station—The Need of a County Snow Plow Imperative—The Death of Mr. Jay E. Knapp—Personal News Notes.

He had a stroke of paralysis on August 28, but recovered so as to be around until he was stricken on October 24, from which he only partially rallied, heart failure causing his death.

Funeral services were held at his granddaughters' home, Antoinette Knapp, and in his last days she was assisted by her mother, Mrs. Nettie Knapp. He is survived by five grand-children, Misses Ruth Knapp, Librarian, at Clyde, N. Y.; Antoinette Knapp, Denmark; Mrs. William M. Barrow, of New Hartford; Harold A. and Lawrence Knapp, of Clark's Mills; and one great grandson, Donald L. Barrow. Also several cousins. Funeral services were held at the home on Friday, November 29, Rev. C. C. Frost, of Carthage officiating. Interment was made in Swanbourne cemetery. The bearers were: P. J. Lawton, W. D.
