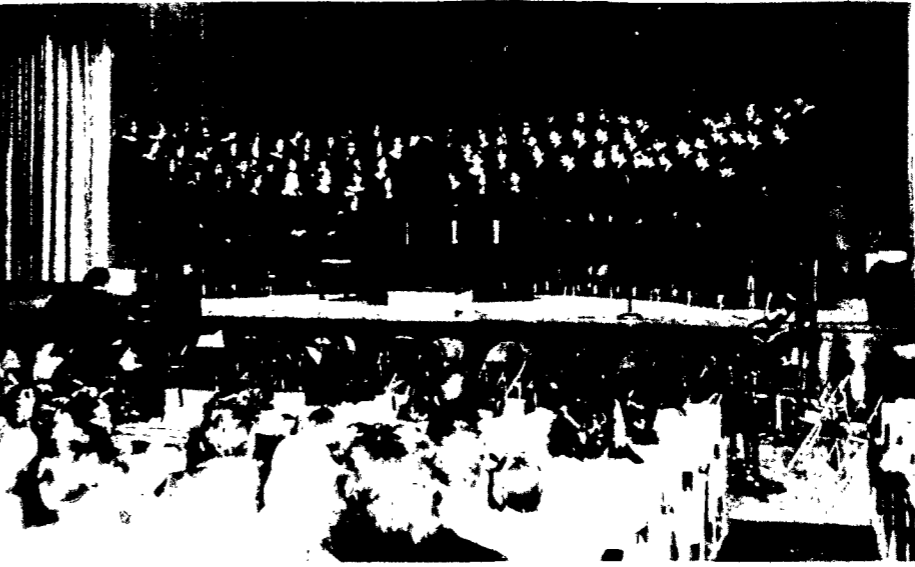

allowed, county employes, mill workers and retired persons will be in serious trouble."

Rev. Robert Kay, pastor of the United Methodist Church, said "Initially we need the service, but the caliber of service leaves a lot to be desired. Projected increases would raise our bill to \$64.74 a month, business rate. Telephones are needed for service to the parishioners. This raise would be a hardship and is not justified."

Carl Kielmann, Summit Avenue, speaking for the Lewis County Trust Company, said "The company should be commended for its adequate service. However, an increase of 40 per cent at this time is inopportune and not in line with wage-price ceiling. I ask that, if the increase is granted, the area be given more toll-free service than just to Croghan."

Donald Colton, Boonville farmer, stated he was forced to pay a high rate for installation because of the distance from Boonville. He said, "I have to make all calls long distance. No stable businesses I deal with are within dialing distance. We need better service and more territory coverage."

Urban Kereber, speaking as Castorland village clerk and treasurer, stated that he was required to install a new sewage plant, thus exceeding the debt limit for the village. "These types of increases," he said, "cause lifetime residents to leave to seek life elsewhere. We oppose the increase without better service."

flights to locate deer wintering areas presently being used as well as areas possessing characteristics which give them the potential to carry deer herds successfully through winter periods.

The biologists are now conducting ground checks in areas located by helicopter. Many of the areas with wintering deer and some with potential for wintering deer are located on state-owned reforestation areas in the Tug Hill Transition Zone.

Management programs that will evolve from these studies may include the following: (1) Trapping and tagging of deer. Re-tagged deer will provide information regarding movement of deer. Some trapping and tagging may take place near Lake Ontario to determine whether deer wintering there travel to the Central Tug Hill Area at other times of the year; (2) Deer yard improvement - selective logging may be carried out on State-owned lands to increase deer winter food supplies where needed. The logging would include supply of young trees used as browse by deer; (3) Dog control - Department employees will attempt to document deer losses caused by dog depredation. This information will be used to publicize such problems and to secure dog quarantines when needed.

Results of these studies and management programs will be useful to overcome problems in wintering deer numbers in much of Northern New York as well as in the specific Tug Hill Area.

Mr. Leonard B. Lewisville Star Route, said "We just moved here from the Finger Lakes section where we had New York Telephone service. Rates are much higher here, local service is not good."

Mrs. John West, Glenfield, presented a petition with 35 signatures asking the commission not to grant the increase on a mandate that it was unjustified. She noted many persons are on fixed incomes, unemployment is high and, although wages have stabilized, the cost of living continues to rise.

Durr, Boonville, attorney appearing on behalf of the village board stated the state had mandated sewer installation at a cost of \$1,000,000, and landfill operations at \$800,000. "The village," he said, "is now over the set debt limit and the board feels the increase entirely too much."

Lawrence Maff, Lyons Falls, speaking for Georgia-Pacific, said "the company's telephone bill now runs \$25,000 to \$30,000 a year. This is out of line with other increases. The plant is now under a mandate of the Department of Environmental Conservation for a waste treatment process costing \$2,500,000. These burdens affecting people in the area make the nature of the increase excessive."

Edward Sieber, Lyons Falls, speaking for the board of education of South Lewis Central School, said "We are protesting this increase as unwarranted. Records show rates in 1972 twice as much as in 1966. Two years ago we installed additional equipment designed to save money, but due to service calls and additional costs this has not been the case."

Robert J. Wilcox, Constableville, speaking for Law Brothers Construction Firm, said "our telephone bill is \$10,000 a year on the corporate level. Since October, we have kept a listing of problems which include operators in Boonville stating this number is no longer working, the number has been disconnected or this number is unlisted. We operate on a tight budget, need to know basis. This type of service is bad for business."

Lewis County Legislator Sam Villanti, Lowville, representing how General Telephone can ask for a 40 per cent increase when industry must maintain wage-price ceiling of 5.5 per cent. I will review their program the same as every other citizen. Villanti filed with the Commission a copy of a recent Journal editorial opposing the rate hike. Approval to file the editorial was granted by Villanti at a meeting of the Board of Legislators the day before the hearing.
