Mrs. Cilista Main was approved as a substitute cleaner.

District Principal Robert McNeilly reported on a meeting that was held between representatives of the Teachers' Association and the Board of Education regarding field trips and conferences. Working on the committee were Carol Peterson, Dr. William Carroll, Douglas Robbins, Byron Washburn, Barbara Gray, Bernard Swartzman, Thomas Yousey, Charles Bunke, Charlotte Zehr, C.J. Shapland and Robert McNeilly. Each field trip or conference will be examined carefully to determine if the expense of time and money is justified in terms of helping to improve the educational program.

Conferences for teachers and parents of elementary children (grades 1-6) will be held on Nov. 14 and 16 and April 17. On those days the elementary children will be dismissed about 12:15 p.m. Conferences for parents of students in grades 7-12 will be held on the evening of Nov. 20 at an "open house" in the gymnasium. Parents of students in grades 7-12 are also invited to a meeting in the cafeteria on Thursday, Oct. 12, at 8 p.m. to hear and ask about the "open school" program. During American Education week all parents are invited to visit the school while the classes are in session.

The board considered a request to permit teachers to have life insurance premiums deducted from their pay checks, but it was turned down due to extra book-keeping.

Administrative Assistant Sheldon Daggett reported on recent meetings of the Building and Grounds Committees which was directed to investigate the location of playground equipment and the improvement of the surface of the playing fields. District Clerk Edgar S.K. Merrell, II, was asked to investigate the matter of liability and negligence when limbs from dead trees fall on school buildings.

John Hayes of the physical education staff presented the new physical education curriculum to the board members for their study and comments. The curriculum resulted from the work of a committee composed of Lyn Fowler, Dr. Henry Geidel, Roberts Lynch (teacher), Brian Greley (student), C.J. Shapland, Lynn Western, Robert Edick and the physical education staff. Dan Strouse, Dorothy McCue, Neal Abuel, Shirley Williams, Gerald Newers, Kay Larabee and John Hayes. Mr. Hayes served as coordinator of the entire project which was financed with a mini-grant from the State Education Department.

Approval was given for use of the gymnasium for Section III basketball quarterfinals on March 9. Schedules for girls' sports for the fall season were approved.

LACS Soccer Activity

In varsity soccer action on Tuesday, Sept. 19, the Lowville Academy and Central School Raiders recorded a tie with Thousand Island Central, 2-2. Lowville dominated play throughout the game, but failed to cash in on numerous scoring opportunities.

Thousand Island scored first at 13:40 of the second period, Lowville came back in the third on a goal by inside forward Brian Kennedy to tie the score. Early in the fourth period Central scored again taking a 2-1 lead. The Raiders tied the game at 2-2 at 14:40 of that last stanza on a goal by co-captain Dave Demko.

Defensively, the Raiders were impressive, as Loren Farney, Lonie Arndt, Henry Geidel, Kim Yousey and Clint Widrick controlled the mid field area in support of the front line. Jeff Bush, Lowville's outstanding goalie, contributed 11 saves to the Raiders fine showing.

On Monday, Sept. 26, Lowville lost a 1-0 verdict to neighboring Copenhagen in a game played at Lowville. Copenhagen scored early in the first period at the 3:16 mark and from then on equalized. Lowville efforts as neither team could score. Lowville came alive midway through the second period and played well through the remainder of the game.

Raider goalie Jeff Bush stopped 23 Copenhagen shots on goal-keeping.
