ASCS Feed Sign-up Set

Sign-up forms, helpful assistance, and a pleasant atmosphere are all on tap at the Lewis County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office, ready for the farm program sign-up period which began Monday, Feb. 5, and will continue through March 16. So reports ASCS County Executive Director Amos Dykeman, who anticipates that approximately 200 farmers in Lewis County will sign up for participation in the 1973 feed grain and wheat programs. "If sign-up is in line with previous years, approximately 30 percent of the eligible farms in the county will be signed up in one or more of these programs," he said.

He pointed out that there has been some revising of program provisions since the last year's announcements were made, and he suggested that farmers should keep a close eye on mail and news announcements from the ASCS county office to be sure they are up-to-date on all program details.

During the six-week sign-up period, Feb. 5-March 16, the ASCS county office will maintain its regular hours, Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., except for Monday, Feb. 19, when the office will be closed in observance of Washington's Birthday, a federal holiday. The county office is located at Reed Block Building, Lowville.

BOND ISSUE - Funds totaling \$3.1 million for new pollution controls at Georgia-Pacific Corp.'s Lyons Falls paper mill have been received and placed in a construction trust fund, according to Gordon A. Sullings, assistant to the vice president of the Northeastern Division, Stamford, Conn., and Everett P. Ingalls, general manager at Lyons Falls. The step concludes a long effort to provide protection for the Black River and continued employment for Lyons Falls, the officials noted.

Final action on the \$3.1 million revenue bond issue for Lyons Falls Environmental Improvement was completed recently in New York City. The Industrial revenue bonds were sold by the Town of West Turin Industrial Development Agency, and underwritten by Blyth, Eastman, Dillon, & Co., of New York City. They are dated to mature December 1, 1992. Trustee for the funds is Commerce Union Bank, Nashville, Tenn. The funds were raised by the sale of industrial revenue bonds issued under the New York State Industrial Development Act and sold by the town agency.

Construction will provide a sanitary system, treatment of bark fines from the woodroom, treatment of waste fibers and spent liquor from the pulp mill and facilities to treat all waste effluents from the paper mill, the latter units accounting for almost half the total expenditures. Work on the project is already well under way. Under

the bonding agreement, Georgia-Pacific will repay the construction trust over a twenty-year period.

Commenting on the program, Ingalls said "Our employees and our neighbors in this area have made common cause with Georgia-Pacific in finding a viable solution to improve pollution control at the Lyons Falls plant. Local people, officials at all levels of local government and the agency in particular have cooperated splendidly in the project. It is this sort of attitude that creates a better community with a better environment, as well as protecting jobs and the local economy."
