Books In Review

Who, but P.G. Wodehouse, could turn a simple plot of a likable boy and boy loves another, into a tickly, funny, work of art. Wodehouse, "master of involved plot and hilarious comic invention," a fun and life-loving, elderly gentleman with over 80 published books to his credit, has woven a simple, "pulp magazine" plot into an involved and enchanting story, "The Plot That Thickened," (Simon and Schuster, 1973).

Monty Bodkin loves Gertrude Butterwick. Gertrude's father says Monty must prove himself by working on salary for one full year as he looks down on people made wealthy through inheritance, which Monty was. Sandy Miller, Monty's secretary, loves Monty.

Ivor Llewellyn, Monty's boss, strongly dislikes Monty (his reason is rather sound, in an off-beat way). But, Mrs. Llewellyn is impressed with Monty, and she "runs" Ivor, so Monty is "home free." Or so he thinks. And here the snowball begins building.

The reader, all at once notices that the author is taking him on a merry chase, he hopes on for the ride to see where its all leading, and for the life of him, he can't get off. He is hooked on Wodehouse.

Complicating all the matters that start popping up, is Mrs. Llewellyn's pearl necklace and the tug between several people who feel each must himself be the "winner" here of this expensive possession. And where are Monty, Gertrude and Sandy in all this? Right in the middle, without even knowing it.

Sometimes subtle, sometimes loud and clear, the humor of Wodehouse worms through the story line and you catch yourself at first quietly chuckling, then laughing out loud. The effect is quite exhilarating, and well worth the reading of this fun-time, relaxing and entertaining book.

I, for one, fully intend to catch up on all the Wodehouse I've missed out on. Your local librarian can help you do the same. She can furnish you with titles, and if the books are not in her collection, she can obtain them through the library lending system. Won't you join me in enjoying Wodehouse?
