

Webworms Hit Trees

Area residents have observed the unusually large number of tent-like cocoons on tree branches this fall. The unsightly tents are caused by the fall webworm (*Hyphantria cunea*), according to Cliff Heddon, Lowville, pesticide inspector, of the Department of Environmental Conservation at Watertown. "No one will deny the unpleasant appearance of the web," Cliff agrees, "but the effect of the worms on the trees is minor."

The webworm larvae builds its protective web as it feeds on tree leaves along a branch. The web protection is so secure, in-

A chlorinating and pumping system will soon be installed, and the water will then be re-tested by state officials. Mayor Cring anticipates the new village water system should be ready for use sometime in October.

Board of Education of Harrisville Central School met August 15 with the following people present: Fred Valencour, Glenn Backus, Gerald Baker, Robert Hooper and Supervising Principal Peter N. Betrus. Absent were David Campbell and Arthur Dooley. The resignation of elementary teacher Helen Clarke was accepted. Two new teachers, Joan Haver, elementary, and Dale La Muri, social studies, will be hired for 1973-74, with the recommendation of the district superintendent. A decision was made to have the high school social studies course be a three-year requirement instead of a four-year as in the past, and in the senior year to offer a current events elective course with subjects to be chosen to meet the needs of the senior students. A bid for school milk, .0252 cents per half pint, was accepted from Drummond Dairy, Gouverneur. No firm bids were presented on fuel oil and notice of bidding will again be published. The Board of Education agreed to again accept the Free Lunch Policy. All families who wish to apply should contact Principal Peter Betrus before Sept. 6. Families formerly receiving free lunches wish to continue to receive them must apply again this year. It was agreed to increase the cost of school lunches to 30 cents for elementary students and to 35 cents for high school students. Extra milk will be five cents. It was stated that Harrisville Central student lunches are still low compared with most other schools.

HORSE SHOW

The Harrisville 4-H Mustangs sponsored a horse show Aug. 19 at Whitmarsh's Lazy W Ranch on Belmont Road. Five area 4-H clubs participated in the 24 classes of judging in front of a near 200 crowd. The following trophies were presented: First place, Fitting and Showmanship, over 13 years of age, Donna Cross, Johnston Builders, Gouverneur; First place, under 13, Jackie Whitmarsh, Mustangs, Harrisville; High Point Trophies for Pleasure Classes: with horse - Jackie Whitmarsh, with pony - Karen Atwood, Redwood; High Point Game Trophy: with horse, Donna Cross; with pony, Pamela Mallette, Harrisville. Additional ribbons, along with prizes donated by area merchants, were awarded to the contestants. The group realized over \$100 from the show and will use it for show preparations, expenses, and trucking of horses to shows. The local group is planning another 4-H horse show to be held in October, again at the Whitmarsh ranch. Until October, the Mustangs will meet each Monday night at 7 p.m., at the ranch, to practice for upcoming horse show competition.
