Green Acres Meeting Set for 17-18

County Agricultural Agent, Charles Stansbury has announced that extension specialists from the Department of Agronomy, will be in Lewis County to launch the Green Acres Program for 1953.

Professor Al Johnson who is widely known for his work in plant breeding, especially with the corn variety, will be present to speak on "Corn Varieties Adjustable to this Area and Increasing Small Grain Yields."

Professor William Garman also from the Agronomy Department will present material on Grassland Farming, Soil Analysis, and Silage Production. Slides, a flag-nel graph and movies will illustrate the practices.

Willard Croney of the Soil Conservation Service will explain how the use of a farm pond can fit into the program of agronomic practices.

Paul Volkert, manager of Lewis County Dairy Herd Improvement Cooperative will speak on "Quality Roughage and Milk Production." This talk will be correlated with the Hay and Silage exhibit which should prove to be of interest to farmers in the area. The meetings will be held in the Court House basement from 10 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on Tuesday and Wednesday, February 17th and 18th.
