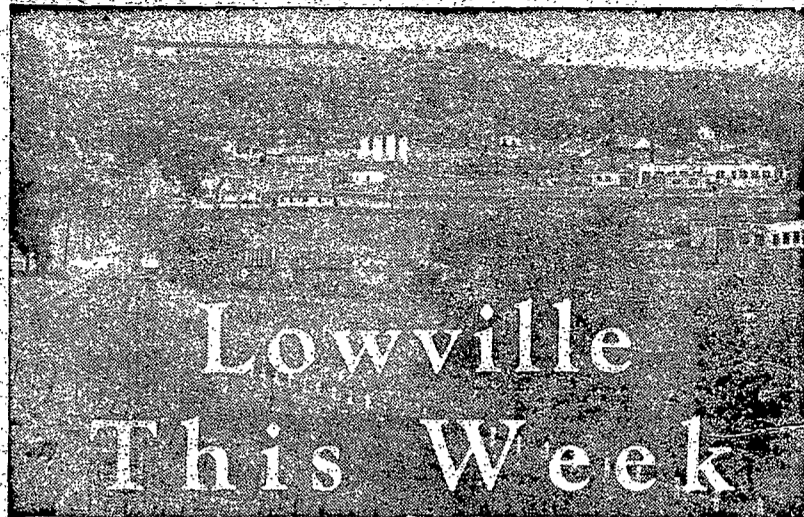

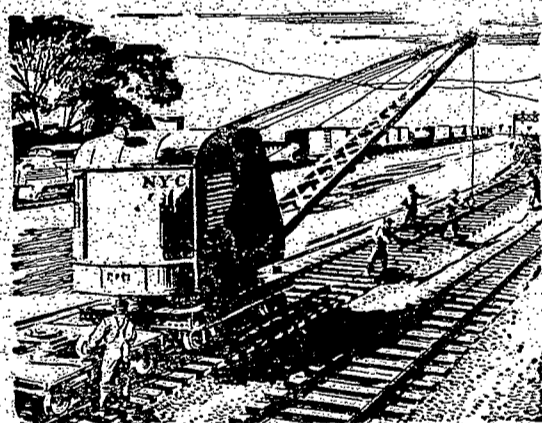

Following the meeting a white elephant sale was held. Refreshments were served by Mrs. Eloise Soper and Mrs. Ruth Brittan.

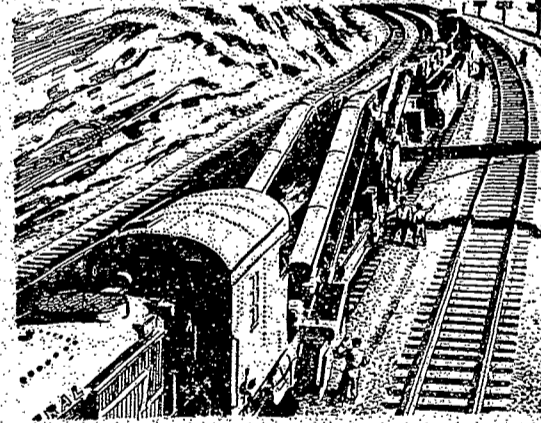
SUNERGOI GROUP TO MEET

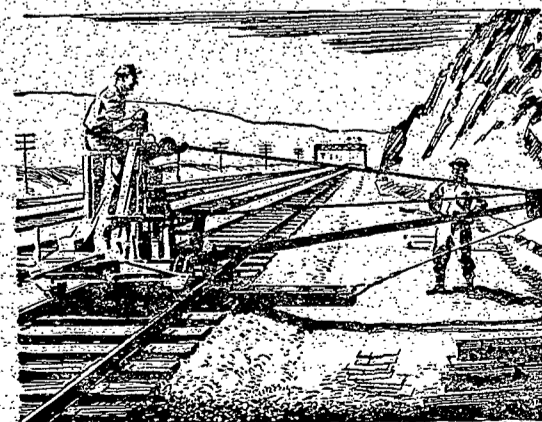

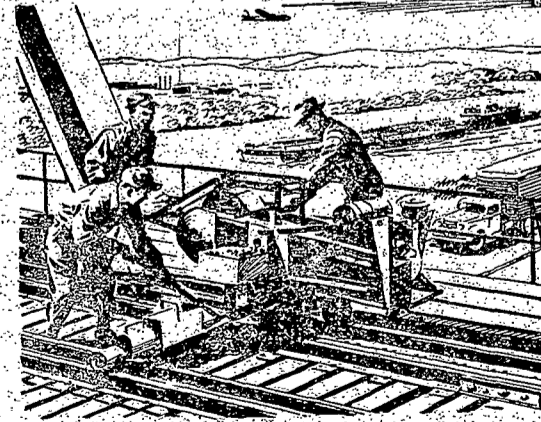
