WASHINGTON, June 2.—A sub-committee of the Judiciary committee of the Senate consisting of Messrs. Harris, Thurston and Pettus heard arguments this morning for the confirmation of the nomination of John H. Hazel to be United States judge for the western division of New York. Mr. Hazel was present.

Senator Depew, who with Senator Platt backed the president's appointment, was also on hand doing all in his power to overcome the opposition. Mr. Hazard of Buffalo seemed to act as chief director of proceedings for the Hazel side of the case and introduced the speakers from that part of the state.
