—A peculiarly constructed freight engine was turned out of the Baldwin locomotive works for the Michigan Central, St. Paul & North St. Marie railroad last week. It is a compound deposed, weighing 207,210 pounds in working order and 181,320 pounds on the drivers. It has five driving wheels on each side with a single pair of boggy wheels. The cylinders are 22 1/2 inches and the driving wheels are 54 inches in diameter. This engine is expected to haul 2,000 tons of freight up a grade 42 feet to the mile without any assistance.

### NO PISTOLS FOR BOYS.

Law Which Takes Effect the 1st of Septem.

The following amendment to the penal code was enacted by the legislature last winter and takes effect Sept. 1. If the law is enforced boys will not be able to obtain and use many of the dangerous weapons which in the past have been so productive of injury and loss of life:

Sec. 402 of the penal code is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 402. A person who manufactures or causes to be manufactured, or sells or keeps for sale, or offers, gives or disposes of any instrument or weapon of the kind usually known as a slingshot, billy, sand-club, or metal knuckles, or who in any city or incorporated village in this state, without the written consent of the police magistrate, sells or gives any pistol, or other firearm, to any person under the age of 18 years, or without a like consent sells or gives away any air-gun or spring gun or other instrument or weapon in which the propelling force is air or spring or air or gas, or to any person under 12 years of age, or who sells or gives away any instrument or weapon known as a toy pistol, in which or upon which any loaded or blank cartridges are used or may be used, is guilty of a misdemeanor.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect September first, 1900.

## "UNITED" DEMS.

Situation In The Second Chautauqua District.

### VIEWED BY FIRST DISTRICT.

The Unaffiliated Are Titled Into Two Fac-

tion Convention Development in Two Conventions—Districts to be Held—List of Delegates to State Convention

The "united" Democracy of the second Chautauqua assembly district are still evidently bent on proving that they are the unaffiliated and unexcelled Democracy when it comes to anything in the line of organization and belligerency.

The situation in that district is an outgrowth of the Mot-Dowd vs. Sherman-Hoffman fight of last June. It will be remembered that the Dunkirk district convention terminated in the usual row between the whippersnappers, Toomey and Heffernan. Two sets of delegates to the state convention were chosen. When it came to naming the call for the fall district convention trouble appeared and harmony vanished. Delegates to the state, senatorial and congressional conventions are to be selected at a meeting and important results are at stake upon control of the state delegates.

At the last state convention, the Mot-Dowd delegates were seated by a unanimous vote of the committee on contested seats. The Toomey faction, places the stamp of regularity on their district committee, which is composed of Isaac P. Avery, E. E. Bailey and Daniel A. Reed. Monday one of these gentlemen took a notice to the Dunkirk Herald, the only Democratic daily in the county, of call for the district convention at Mayville, Wis., August 20. Now, C. F. White, editor of The Herald, is a close friend of Police Justice Heffernan and was the chairman of the state convention. Therefore, he refused to print on the ground that he was chairman of the district committee and they had not called a convention. Monday's issue contained a call for a convention at Dunkirk, August 28, signed by C. F. White, Augustus Blood and Thomas Logg.

Accordingly, there will be two conventions at different times and places. Two sets of state delegates will be named and two assemblies offered up for sacrifice.
