NEW LIQUOR BILL

Calculated to Benefit Grape Growers Has Been Introduced by Assemblyman Fowler. ALBANY, March 12 (Special)—Five below the full text of the bill introduced by Assemblyman Fowler last week, relating to the sale of liquors by grower of fruit or a manufacturer of liquors in a town, in two gallon quantities. The bill is referred to the committee on the Chautauque grape belt. It is understood that by payment of a license tax of twenty-five dollars, manufacturers may sell liquor in quantities of two wine gallons or more, but only for delivery outside of such town, except that such liquor may be sold and delivered in such town to the holder of a liquor tax certificate under sub-division three of section seven of this act. (Daily licensed drugists.)

Assemblyman Cook of Erie county has an idea that the rate of interest is too high in Erie county and would lower the same to five per cent. It seems from a superficial view that Erie county is out of proportion to that given by banking corporations upon savings bank accounts. The money lender can charge 10 per cent if he deposits his money in a saving bank, why then should he be allowed to charge 12 per cent upon money loaned some poor borrower? It is now supposed that the legislative committee will be all out by the close of the first week in April. Speaker Nixon has been in New York, ostensibly to consult the organization upon the disposal of legislative matters on the calendar. There is an air of mystery about the proposed public constitutional bill that came before the speaker's committee. The talk about the capital that Senator Platt and Gov. Odell do not agree upon is passing, may or may not be true. It is not given the common head to know the court secrets of these later days. It is claimed that Gov. Odell is "agin it."

"POKE" SOULES' END OF TRAGIC ORDER

Once a Well Known Engineer on the Lake Shore--Noted For Daring Acts--Hauled the Vanderbilt Special.

In the tragic death of James Soules, recently at the Soldiers' and Sailors' Home in Erie, there ended the life of a man who some years ago was the most daring and reckless engineer that ever pulled a throttle over the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern railroad. Twenty-five years ago there was not a train on the line of the Lake Shore & Michigan Southern railroad. "Poke" Soules, as he was called, was not a favorite with the boys and girls of the village. They used to walk in line with the name of the engine that Soules ran—and it could be distinguished by the peculiar whistle a mile or more distant. If it were recent time there was a rash of boys from the school home to the railway depot to wave hands or caps at "Poke" Soules, as he spoke through the town. After dark the screams of the Indians often summoned the boys and girls to do up to hold up lighted lamps while "Poke" Soules, leaning out of the cab window, would acknowledge the greeting with several sharp blasts as the iron horse leaped through the darkness. It is no exaggeration to say that "Poke" Soules was the most popular engineer in the Erie division. Women and young girls who lived alongside the railroad tracks would drop their work scrubbing, baking, sewing or whatever their hands might be, when they heard the scream of the engine. When a boy made several trips over the Erie division he was "Poke" Soules' favorite. He was not only a favorite with the boys and girls, but he was also a favorite with his own kind.
